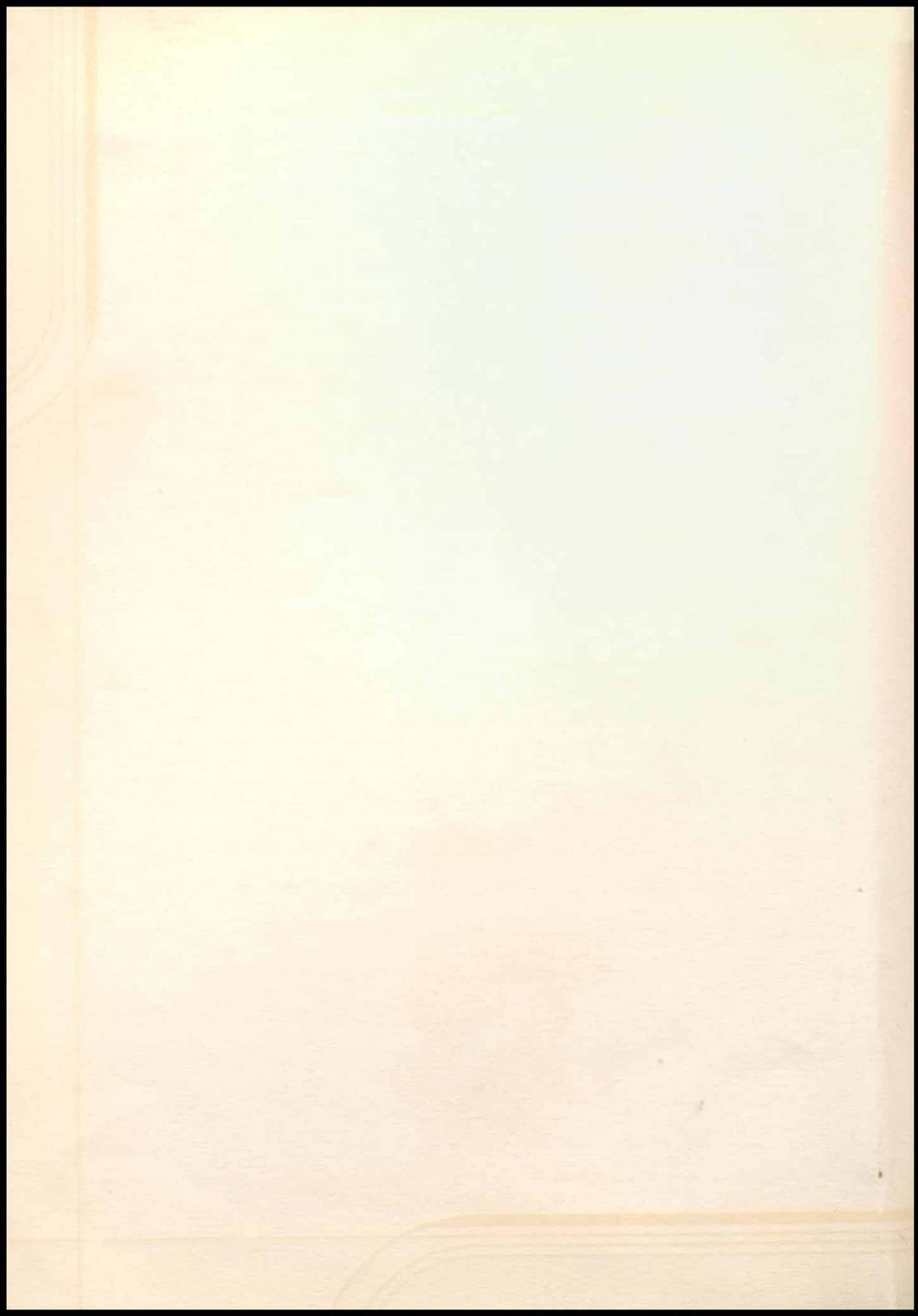
HISTORY OF THE SENIOR CLASS

These students started their High School days with a bang. Elizabeth Ann Davis, candidate for football queen, was successful in her race and was the first Freshman to rule the New Boston Lions.

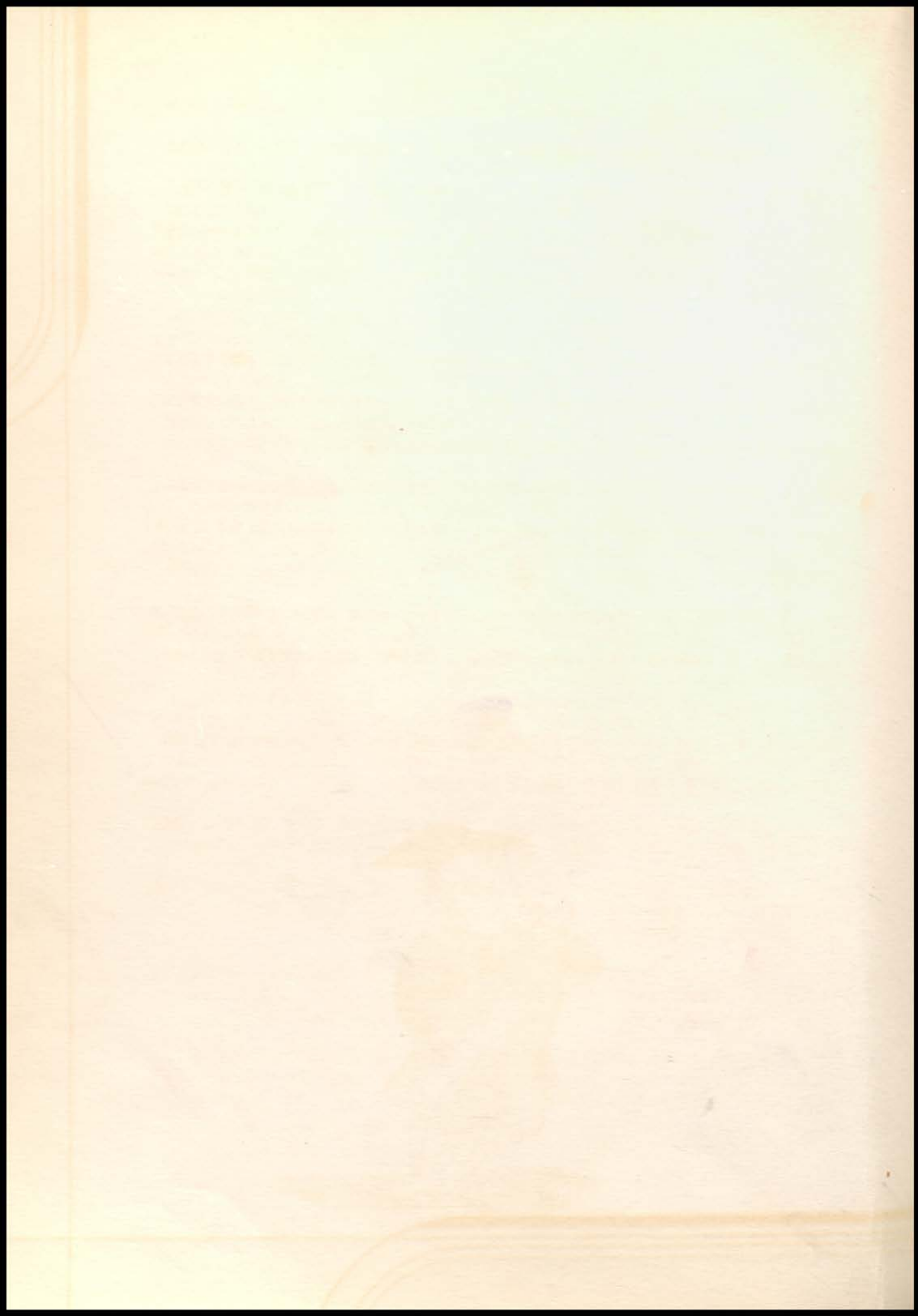
The Sophomore year was less colorful. Billye Faye Daniel, our candidate for football queen, ran a good race but was nosed out by an upper-classman.

Deliah Campbell has arrived and is compiling a mammoth city directory of all unmarried men in the city. I wonder if she thinks herself capable of winning a man in that manner?

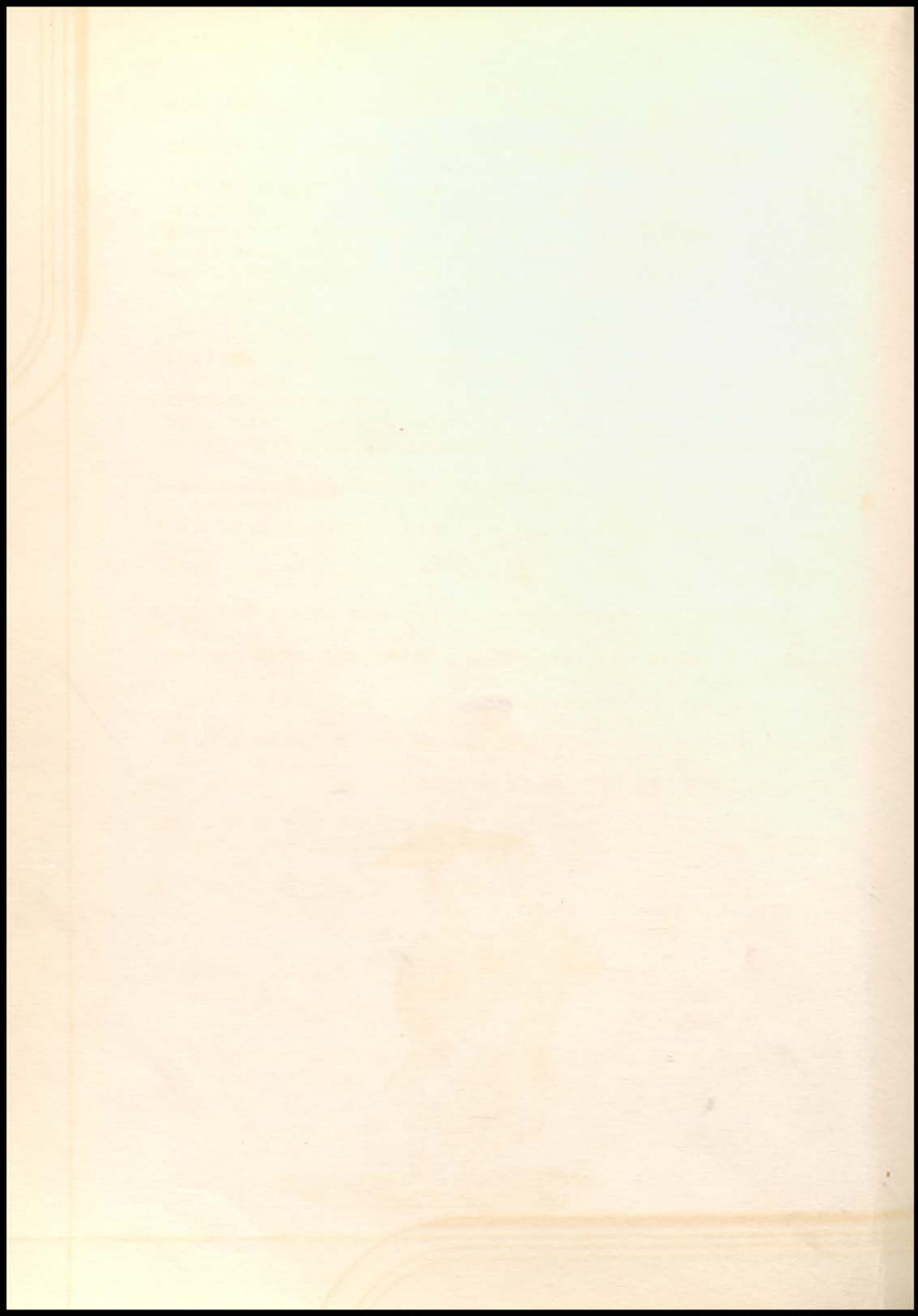

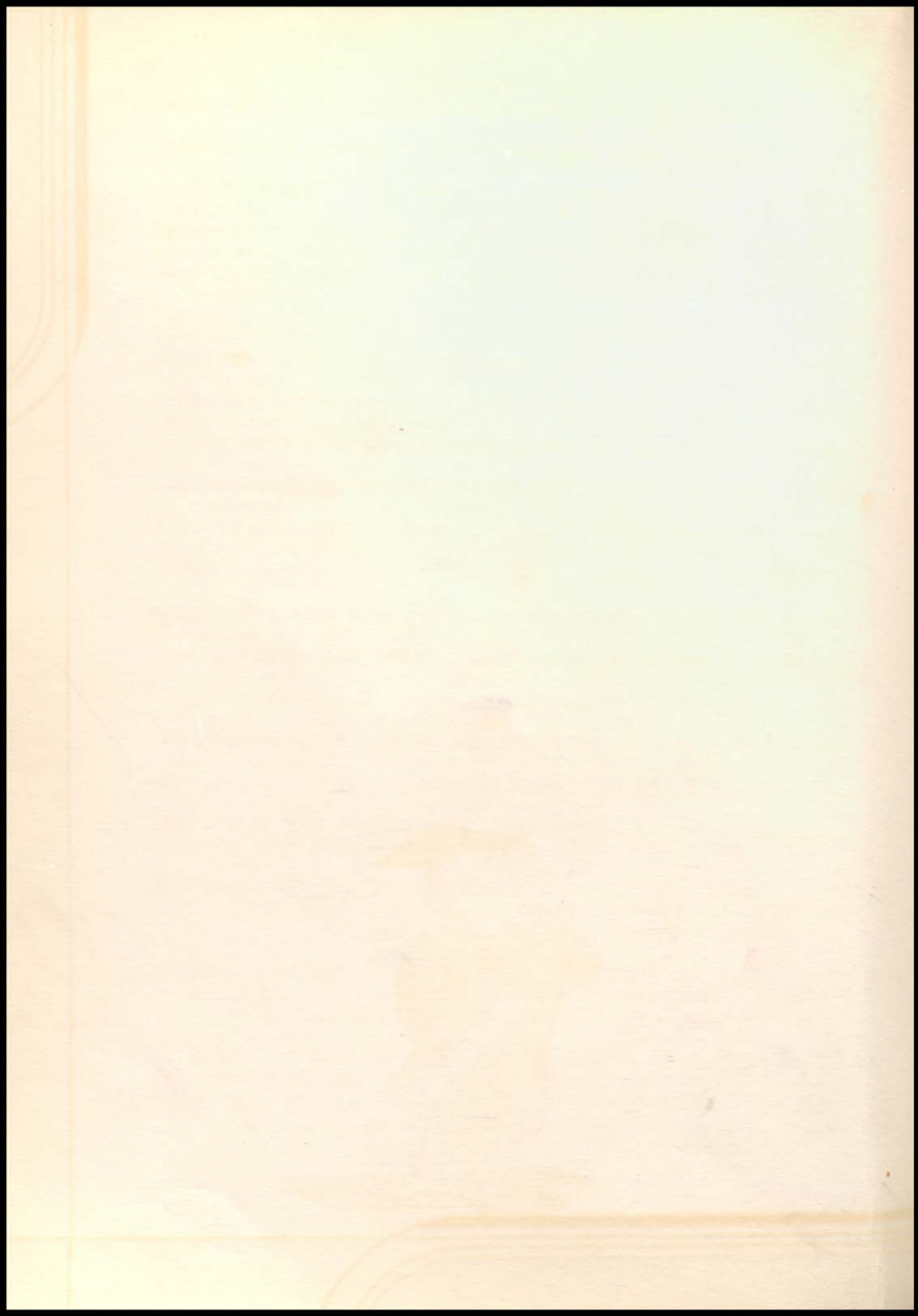

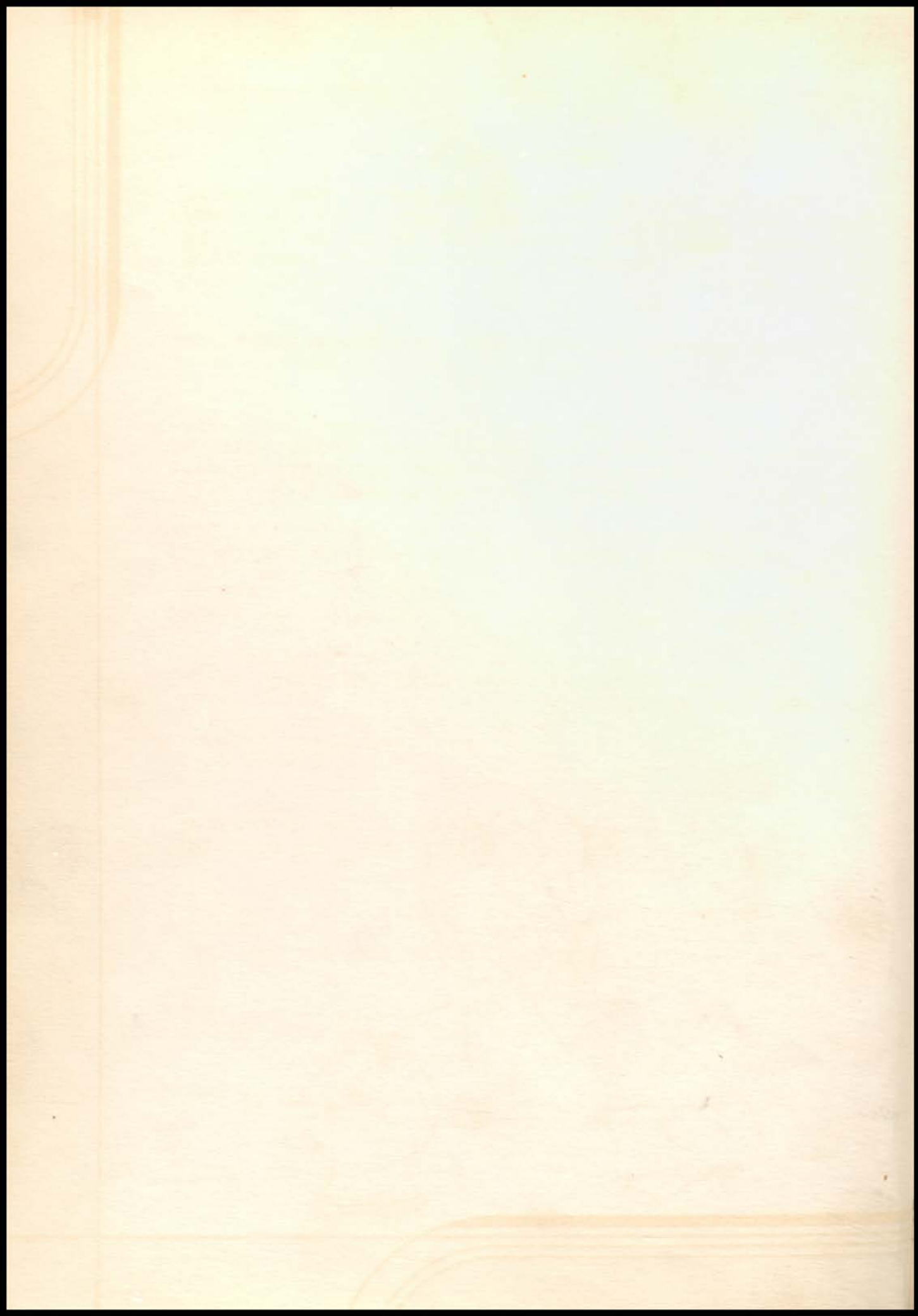

To Johnny Kelley we leave Irby Lee's shoes. May he fill them well.

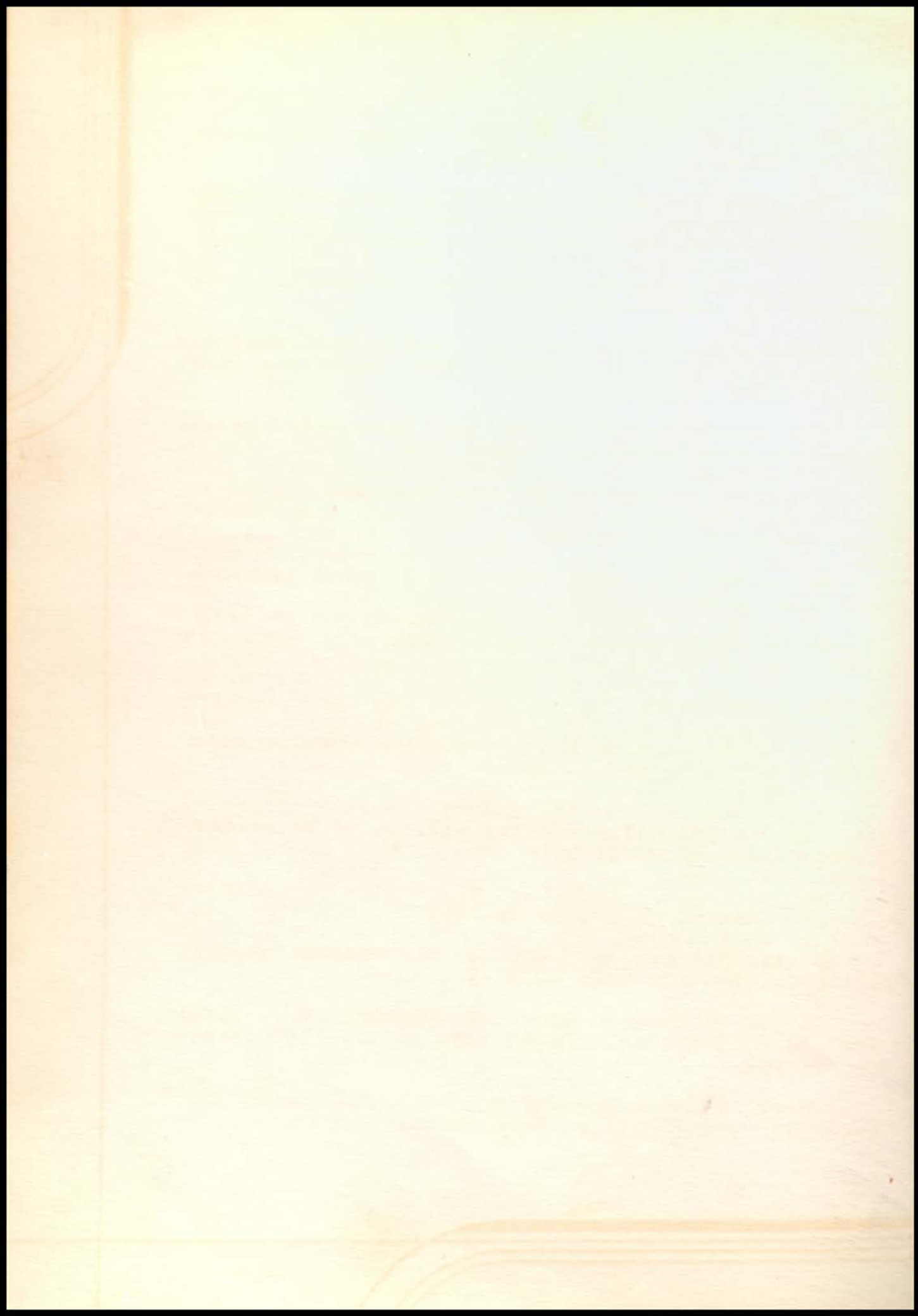
W. S. Desires to leave his vanishing cream to Bill Campbell so he won't have to shave before he is twenty-one.

JUNIOR CLASS HISTORY

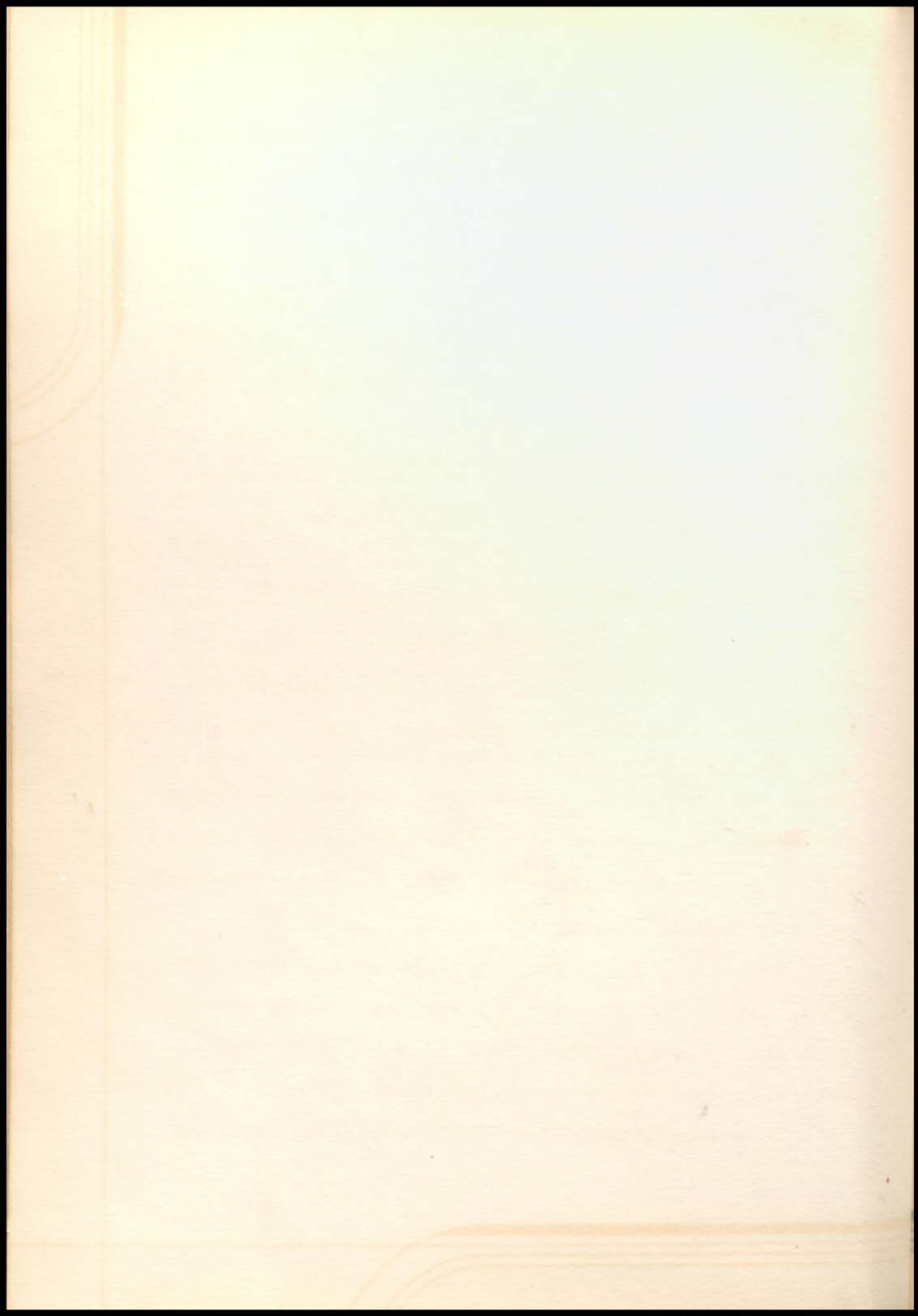
September, 1938, marked the beginning of high school for the present Junior Class. The students welcomed several boys and girls from outlying schools as members of the class. Although the class received no medals of honor, the students underwent a struggle in the abrupt change from grammar to high school. The best the class could do was to adjust itself to the change and to look forward to its future.

The Sophomore year was less adventurous. Little change was made. The monotonous routine was broken frequently by class parties. Members of the class formed serving committees for the Teachers' Banquet and for the Junior-Senior Banquet.

The Junior - Senior Banquet loomed before them, a constant reminder that the Juniors must sponsor it. As mid-term drew near, all class activities were dropped in a desperate attempt to pass all examinations.

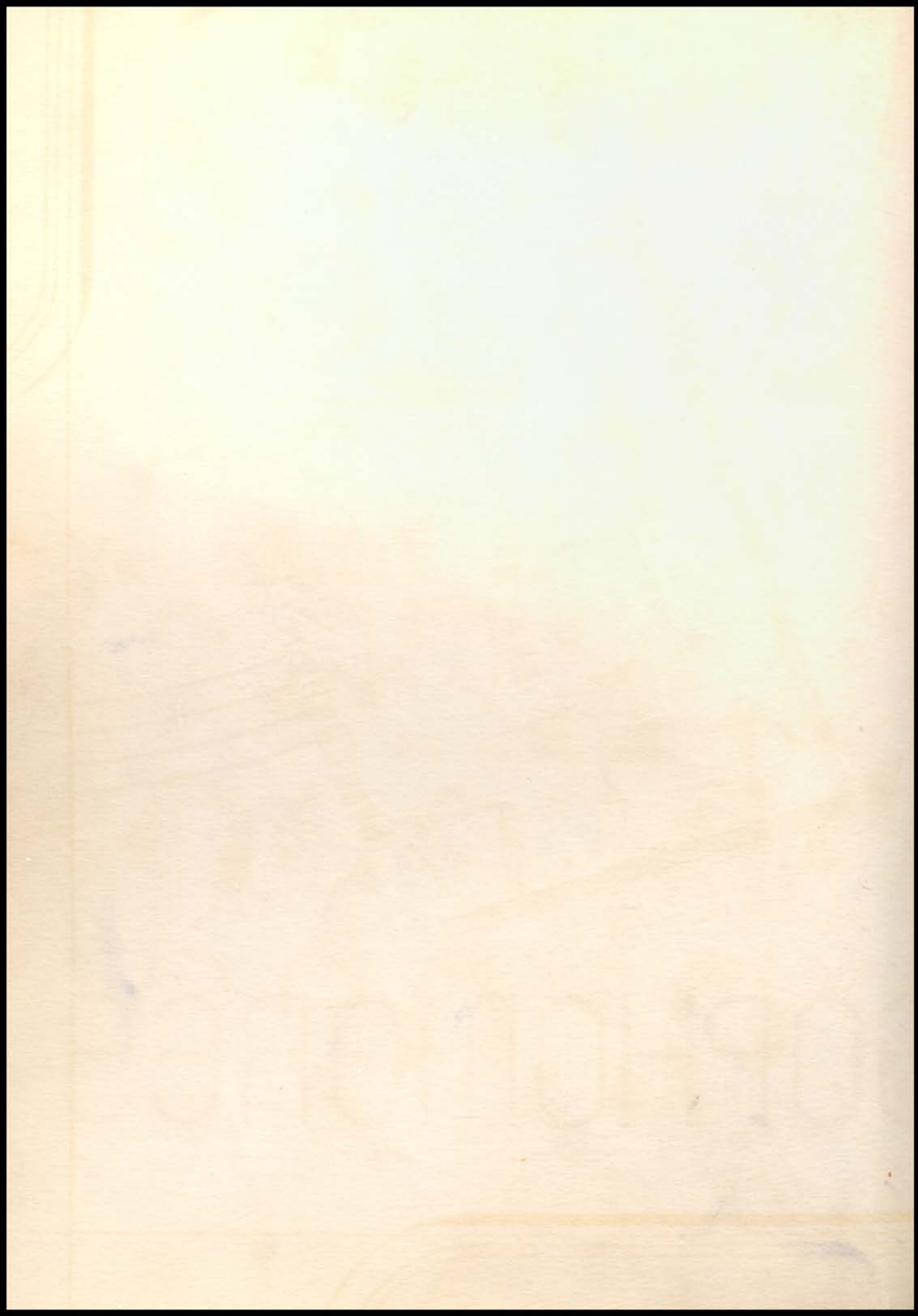

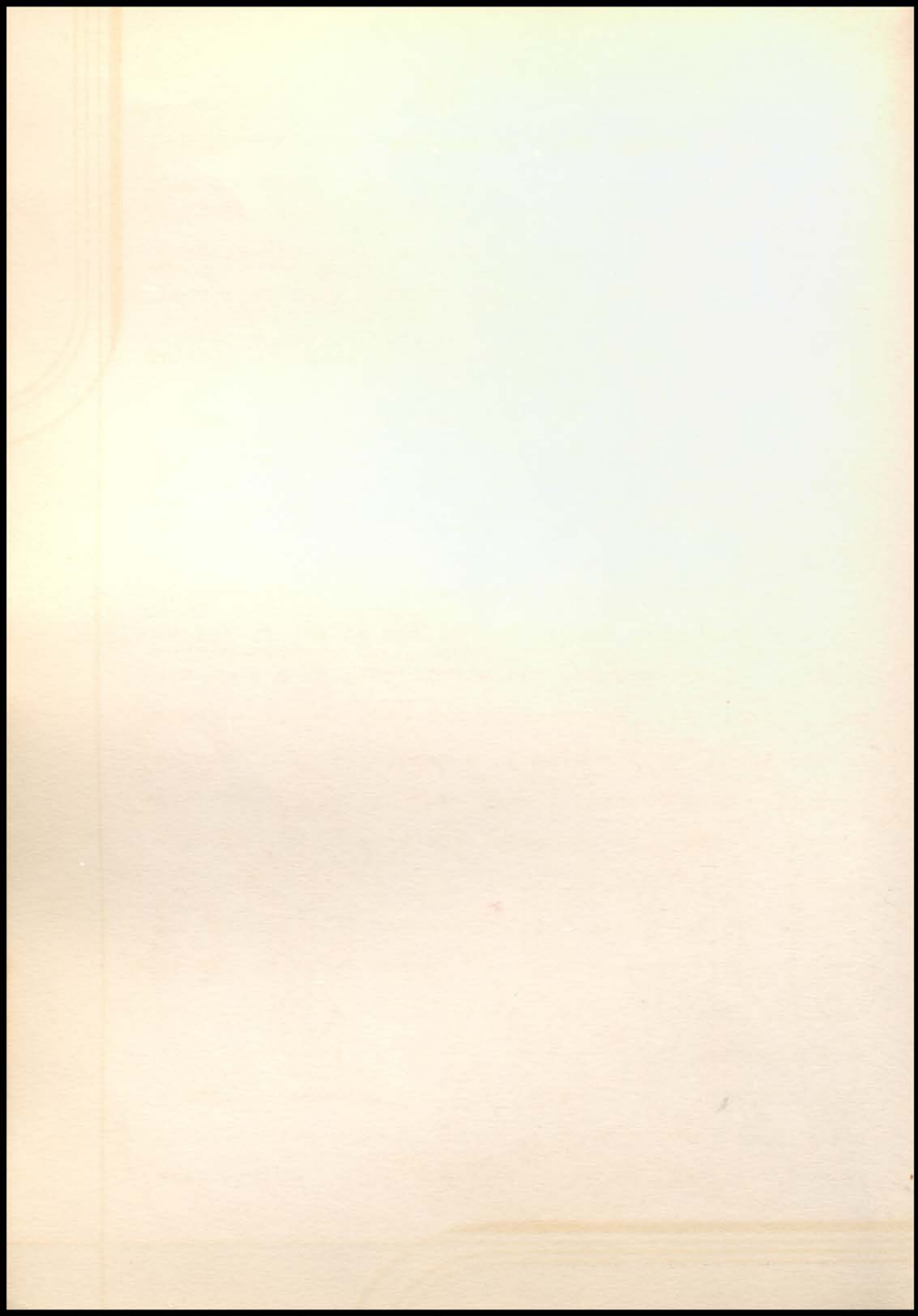
SOPHOMORE CLASS HISTORY

In the homemaking department many Sophomore girls are studying child care and clothing. Most of the boys are studying to become the future farmers of America.

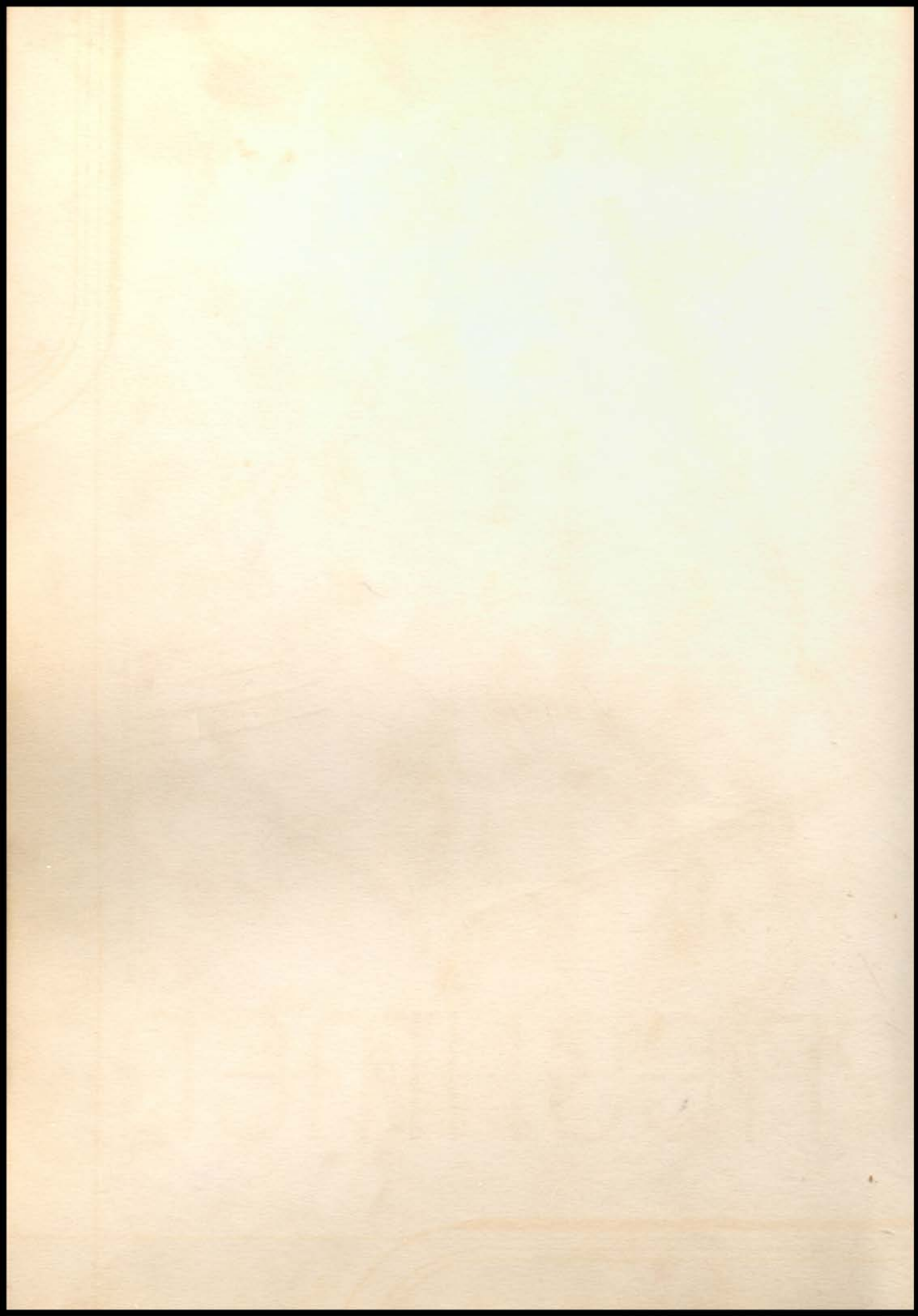

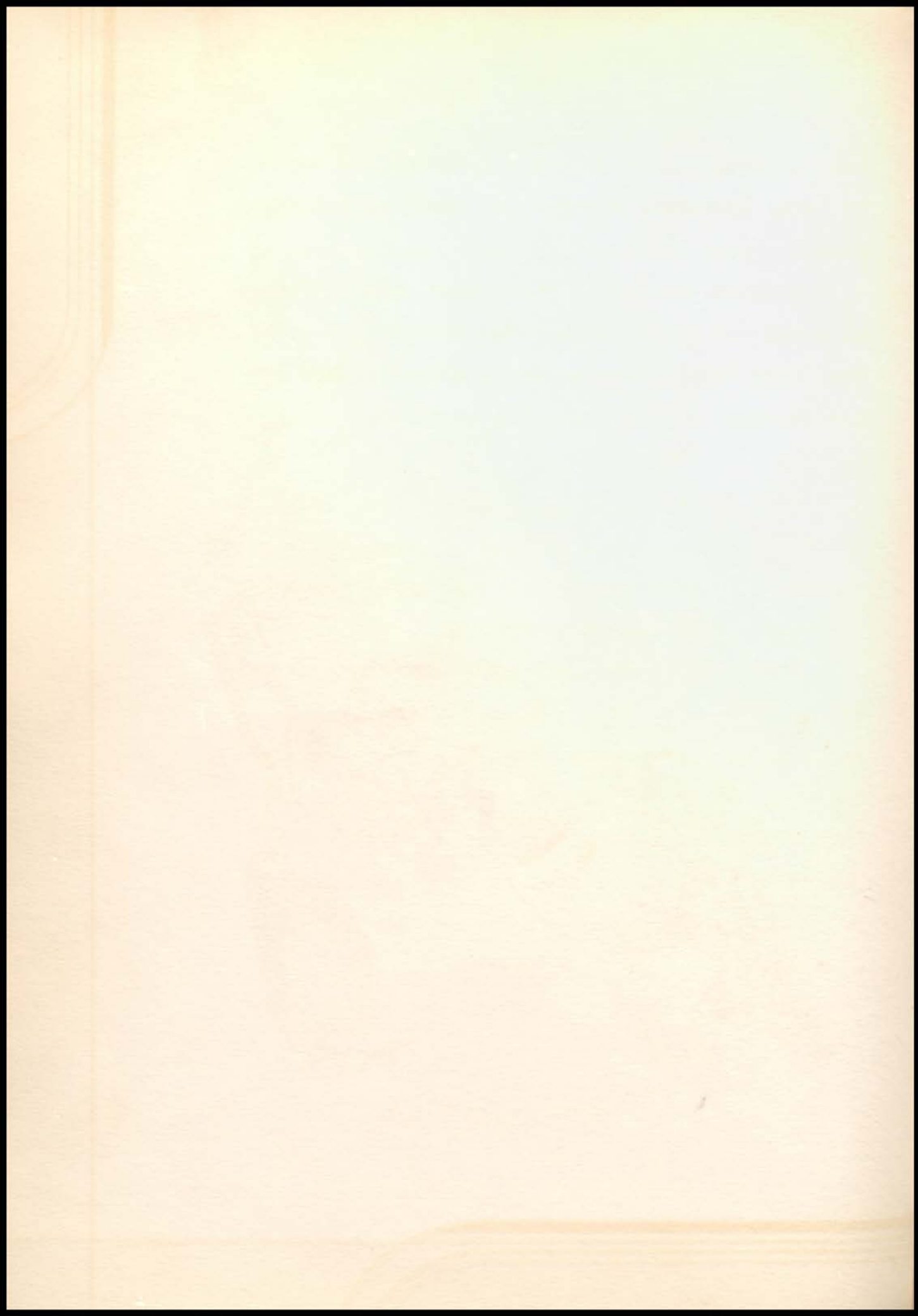
HISTORY OF THE FRESHMAN CLASS

ran a good race but was slightly defeated. She was, however, awarded a small gold football.

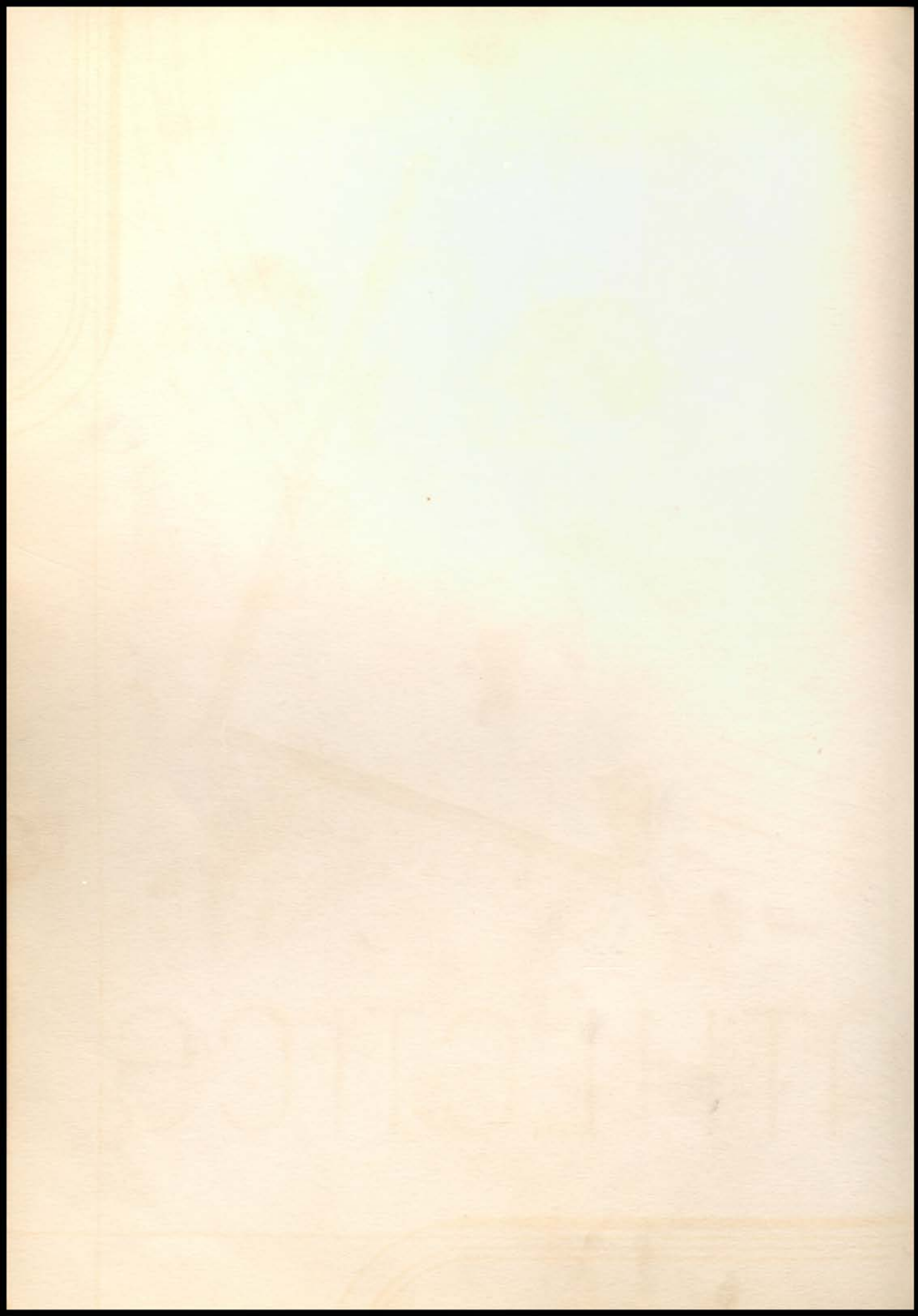
We hope in our future high school years to excel in everything. We expect to be the best Sophomore class in the history of the New Boston High School.

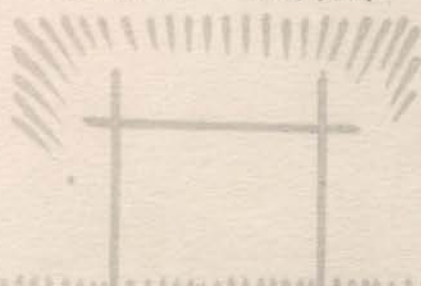

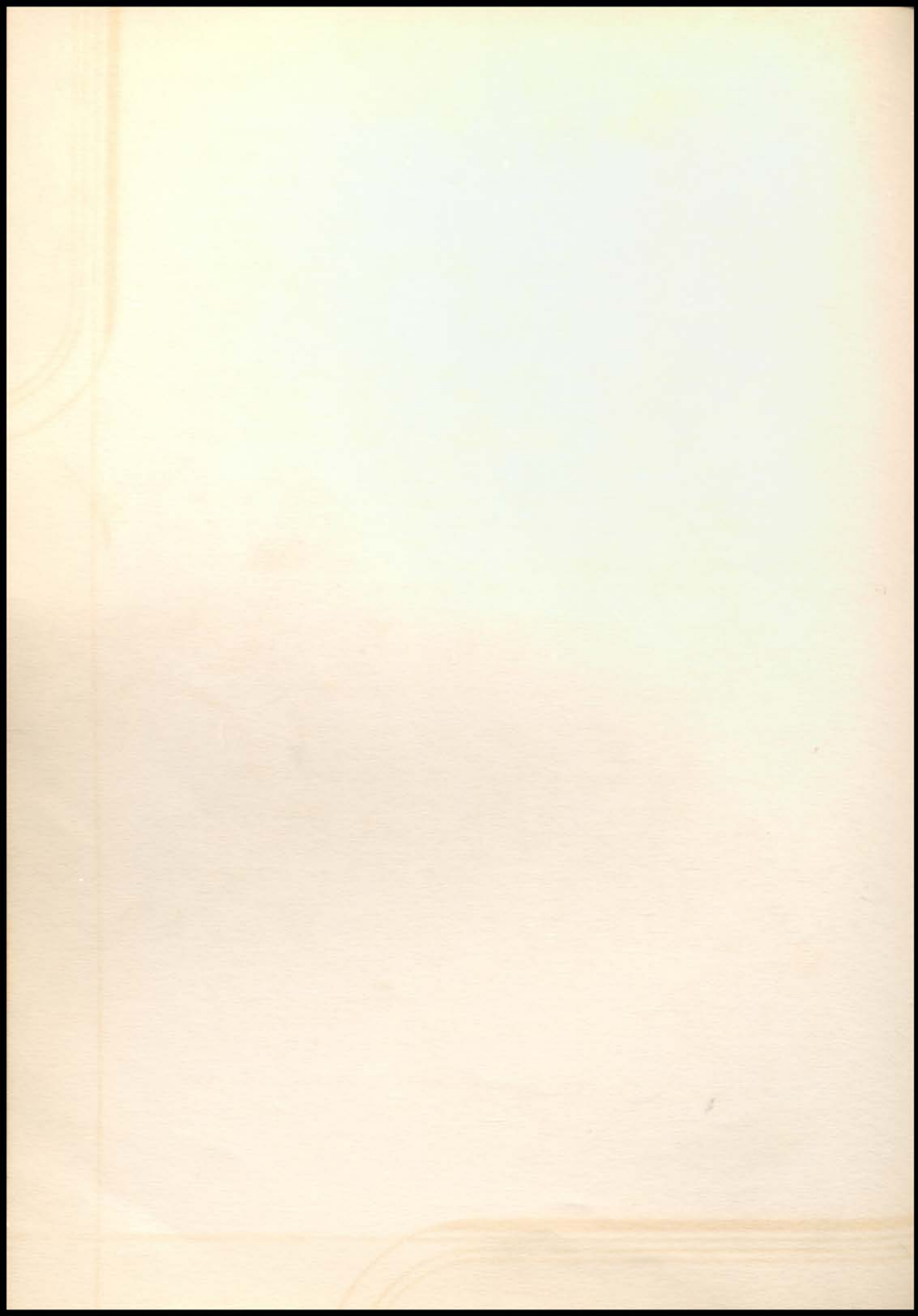

The Lions of New Boston High School started the football season on September 5, 1940 with four men from the '39 squad and plenty new material in prospect. They had their limit of ten games scheduled with an open date on October 4.

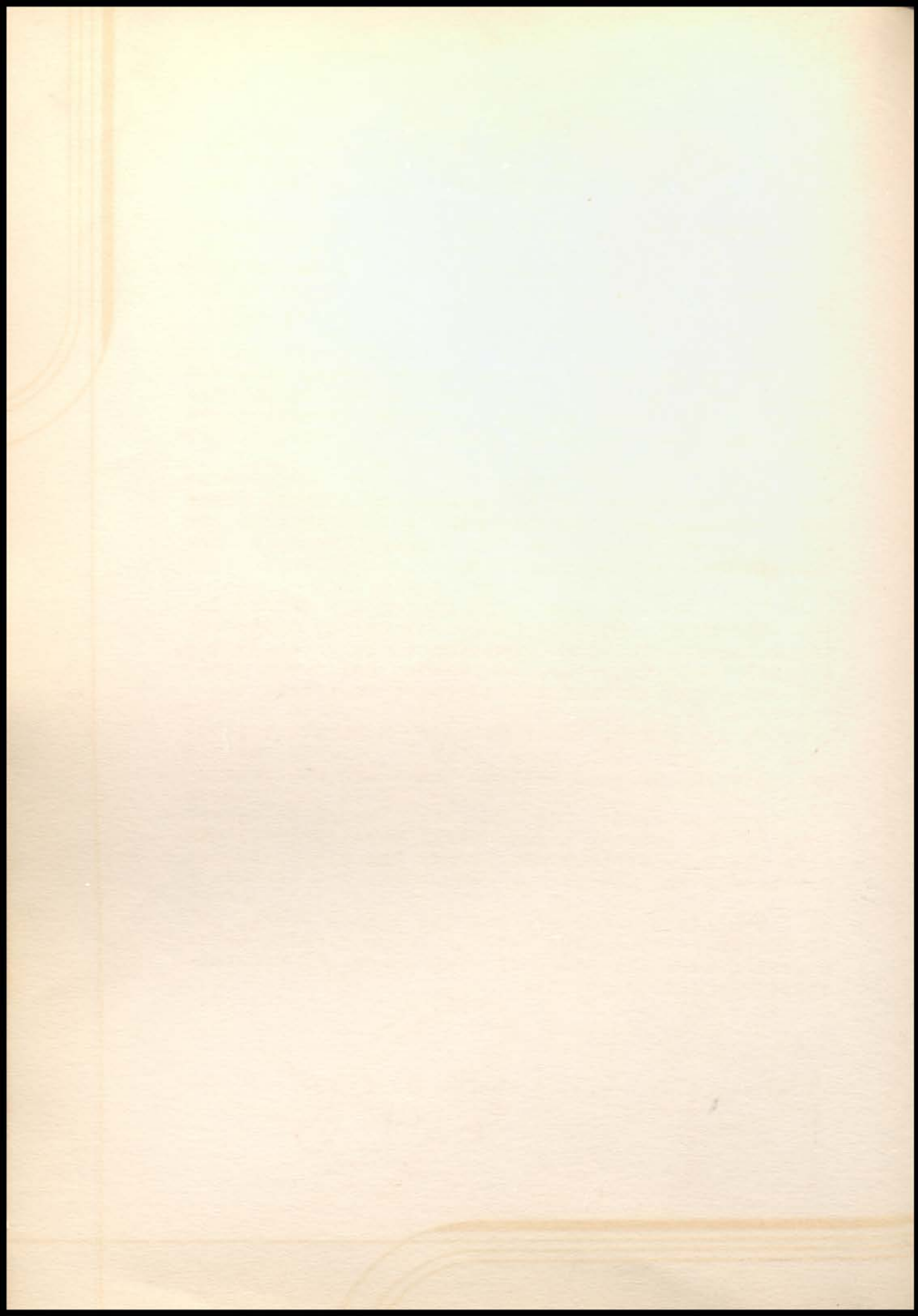
The first game of the season was with Foreman, Arkansas on September 20. Due to lack of experience on the part of the boys, they were defeated 20-0, although the coach discovered some very good material for future games.

The boys engaged Naples here on September 27, and were left holding the short end. Naples, a conference favorite, won 13-0. The coach discovered a new offense man during this game.

On October 4, the boys did not have a game. This gave the coach more time to develop the new offensive to be used against the next opponent.

On October 11, in order to play Dierks, the boys had to make a ninety-five mile drive, but this was easy as they were very eager to play the Arkansas team. Everyone, except the Coach, thought that the Lions were in for a very decisive defeat at the hands of The Dierks High School team. The Lions played hard but were defeated only 20-14. However, as they came home, the boys by winning a moral victory, were in better spirits. Their passes, by completing 20 out of 30, a very good average, kept the Dierks team on the edge throughout the game.

The Lions tasted their first victory over



Daingerfield, October 18, with a score of 7-0. Both teams fought hard but the Lions were the tougher with their passer still hitting his marks.

During the next game with the Atlanta Rabbits on October 28, the course was changed. The Lions outweighed and out numbered, held the Rabbits to the tune of 33-0, although they had to work to get it.

November 1, the Lions met Jefferson, but in spite of their hard training and playing, were defeated 7-0. By being too confident and by not being on their toes for all tricks, especially a "hide out", they lost the game.

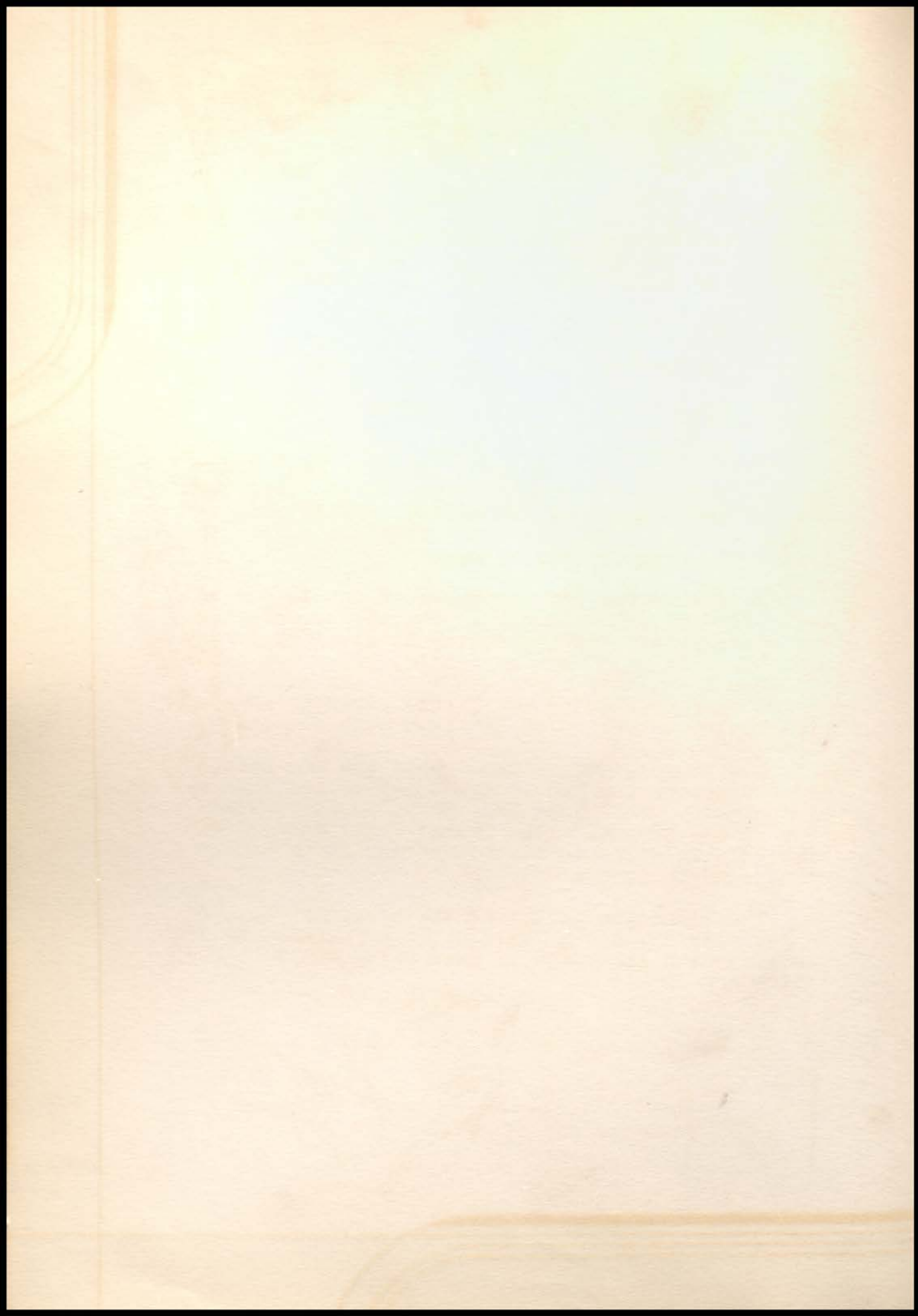
Hughes Springs came to the "Lions Den" November 8. The Lions expected an easy victory over the Mustangs, but when the clouds drifted away and the Lions came to, they found themselves on the short end of the score, 19-0.

Next came the game with Linden the leader in the conference, November 15. The Lions, crippled the week before, and choosing to save their key men for their main grudge battle, tried out their "B" boys for almost three quarters and held the champs to a score of 63-0. Here's power to the "B" boys in the future of an "A" team next season.

Now the big moment came when the New Boston Lions defeated the DeKalb bears 6-0 in the Thanksgiving game. This was the most "hoped to win" game of the season. The Bears' confidence of winning quickly disappeared within the first three minutes of the game.

The Lions wanted to end the season right, so on November 28, Avery Bulldogs were carried to a cleaning with the score of 20-6 which was a retaliation for an old score.

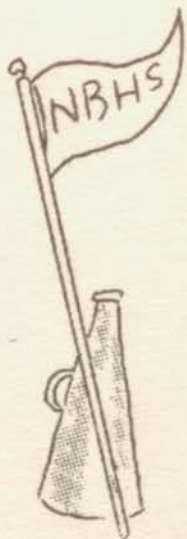
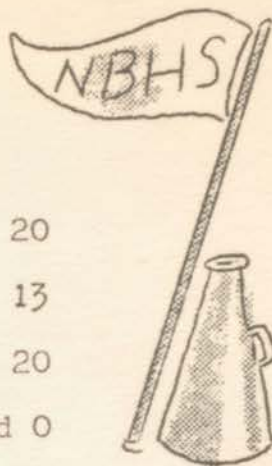

With these excellent records the girls won the "Roar's Tribute" two weeks in succession.



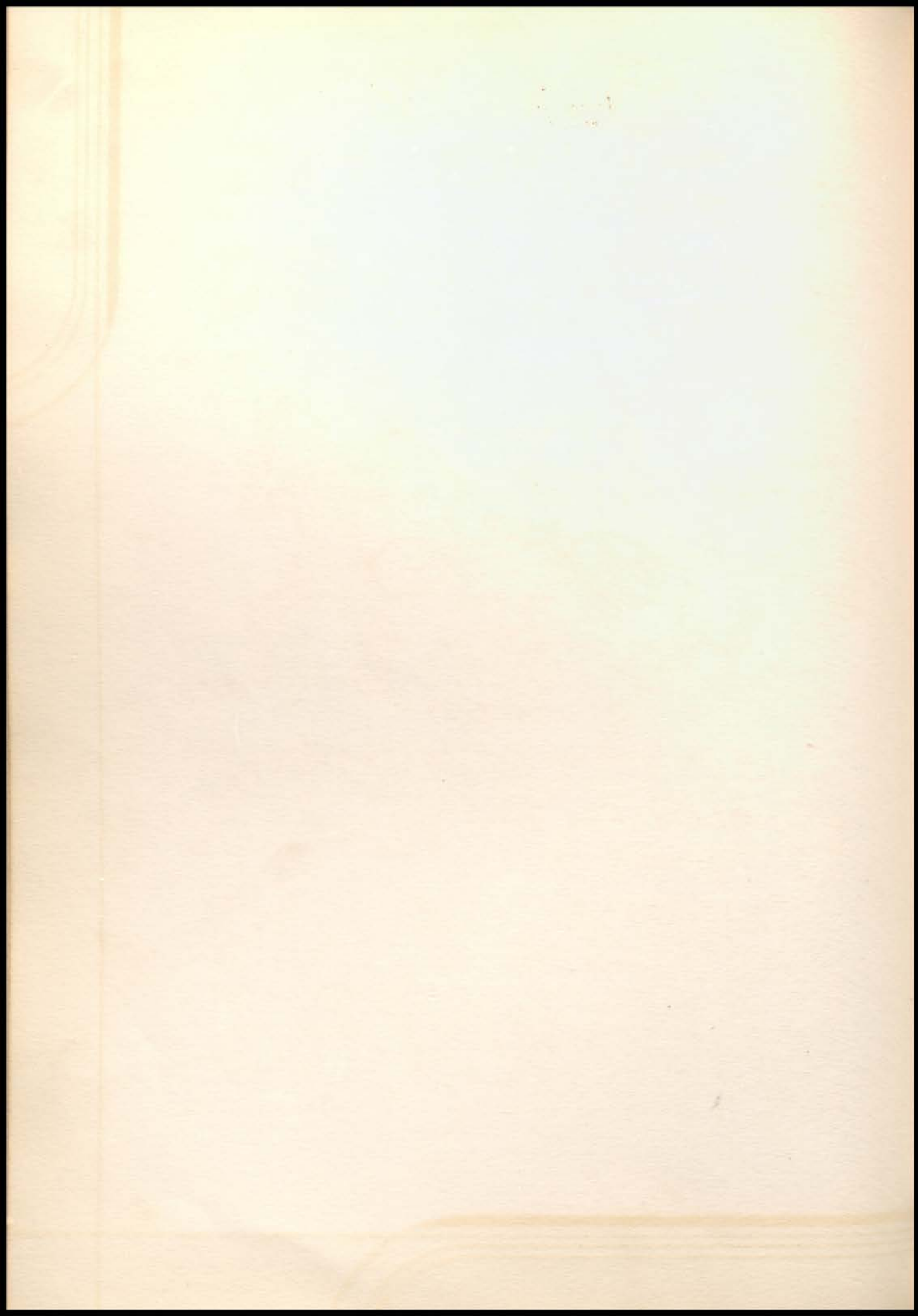
TENNIS

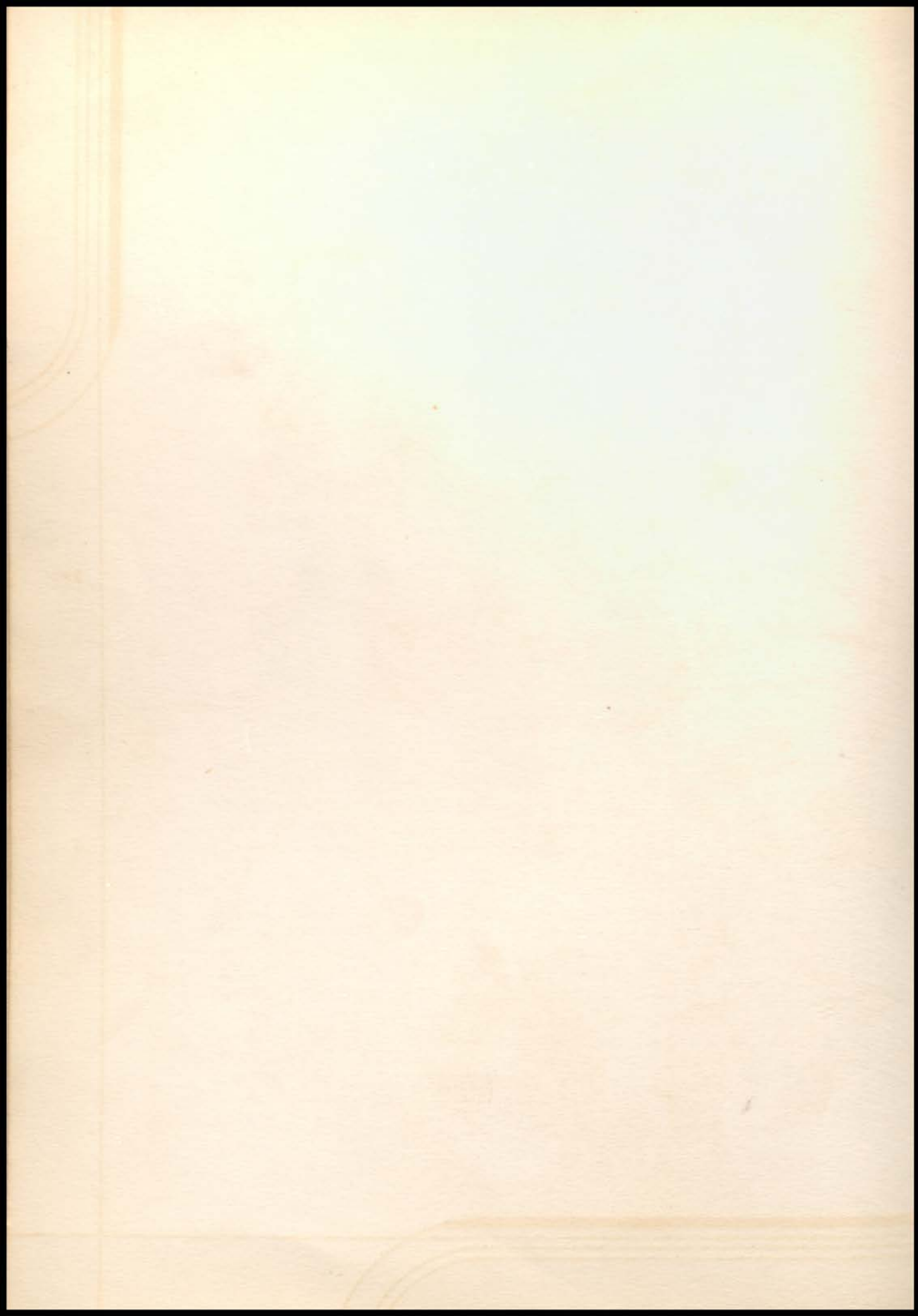
and Dorotha Nell Parker and Lula Alwyn Tidwell certainly are planning on another first place in junior girl's doubles.


NEW BOSTON F. F. A.

The staff hopes that under the capable direction of Miss Moss the 1941-42 staff will continue to edit an interesting paper.

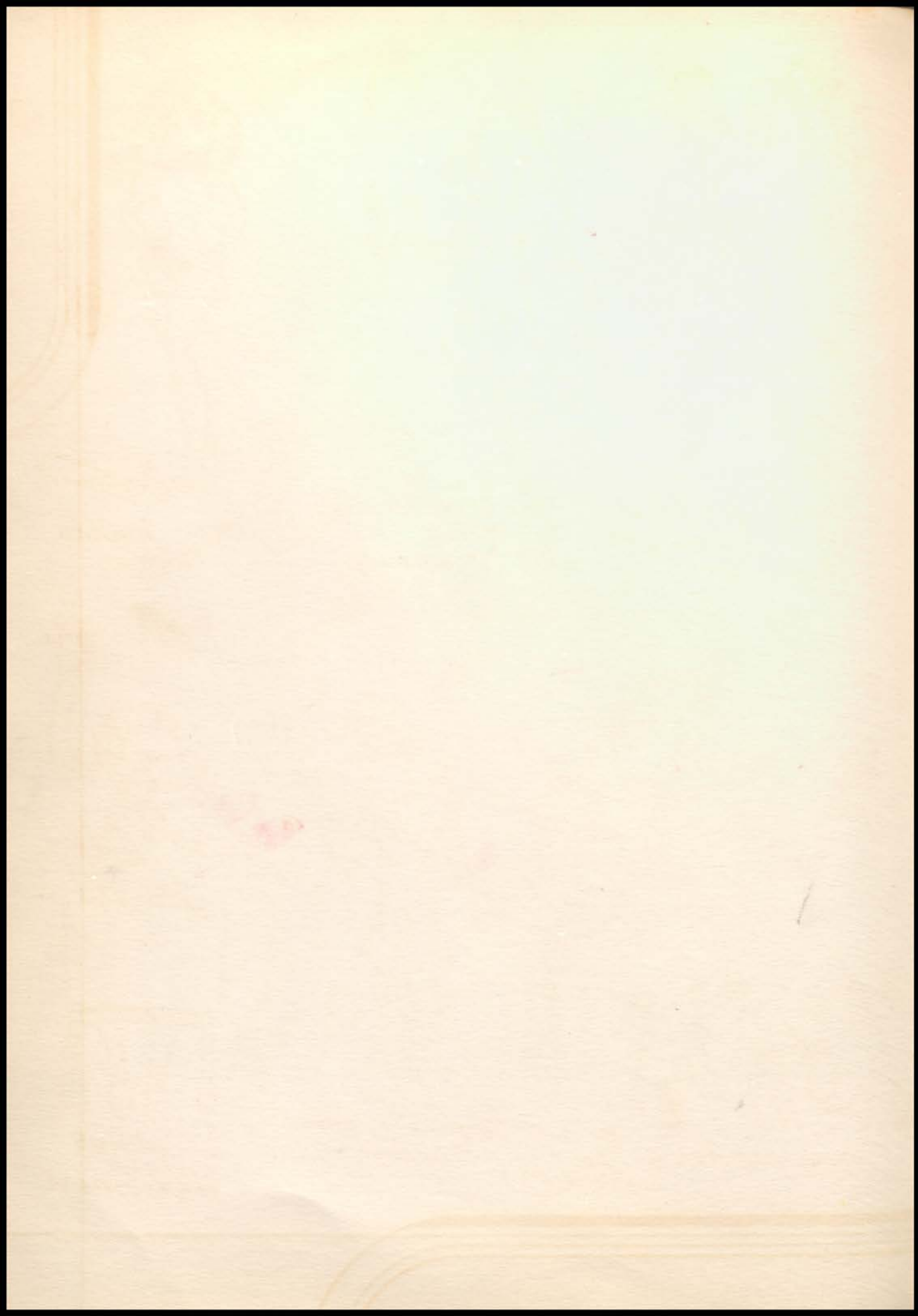
THE STUDENT COUNCIL
