To *Mrs. Dorrrough* we leave this gasoline ration book so that she will have plenty of gasoline to come to school on next year.

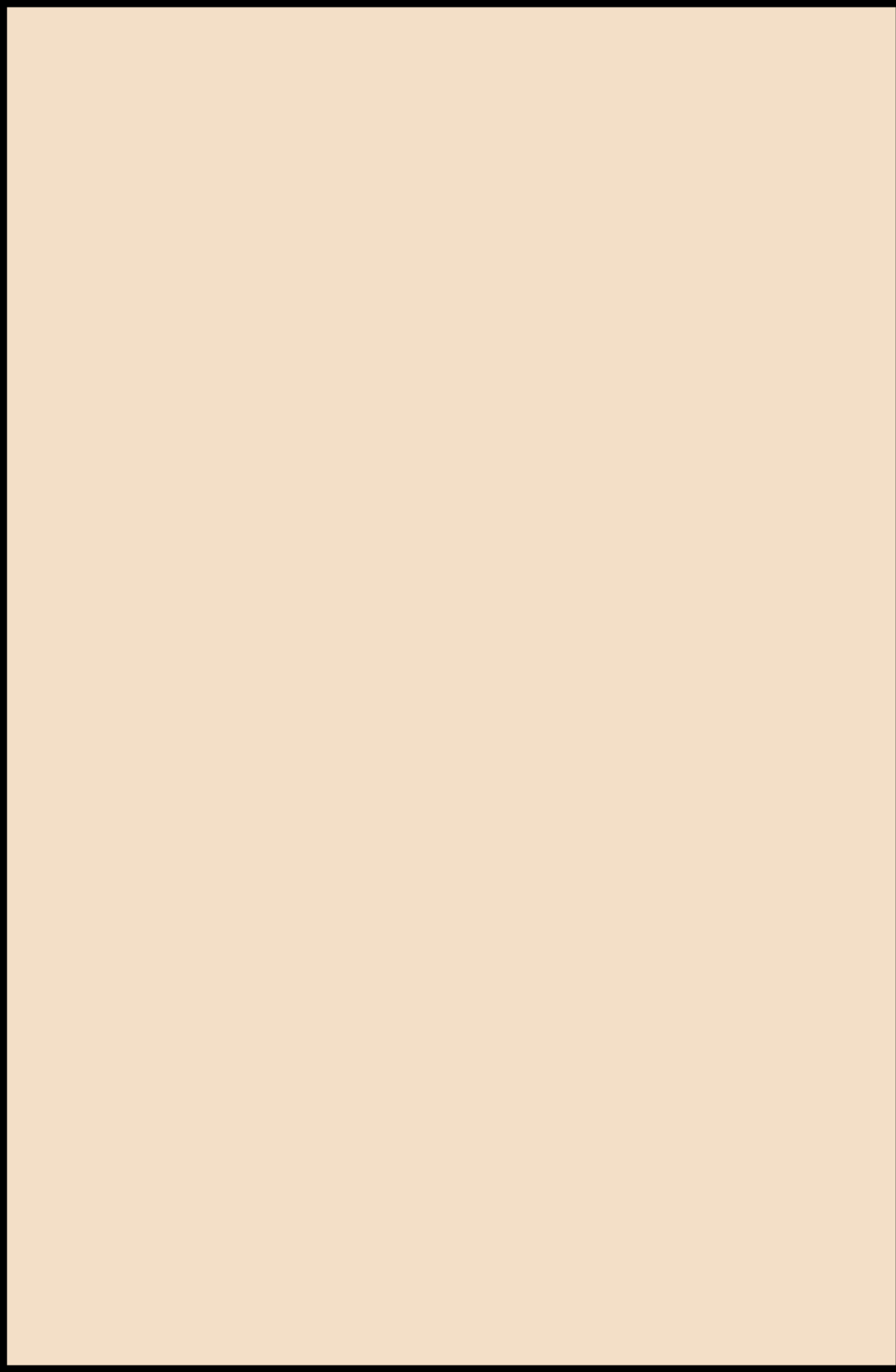

To *Moja Birdwell*, *Hoyt* wishes to leave you his place on the Honor Roll.

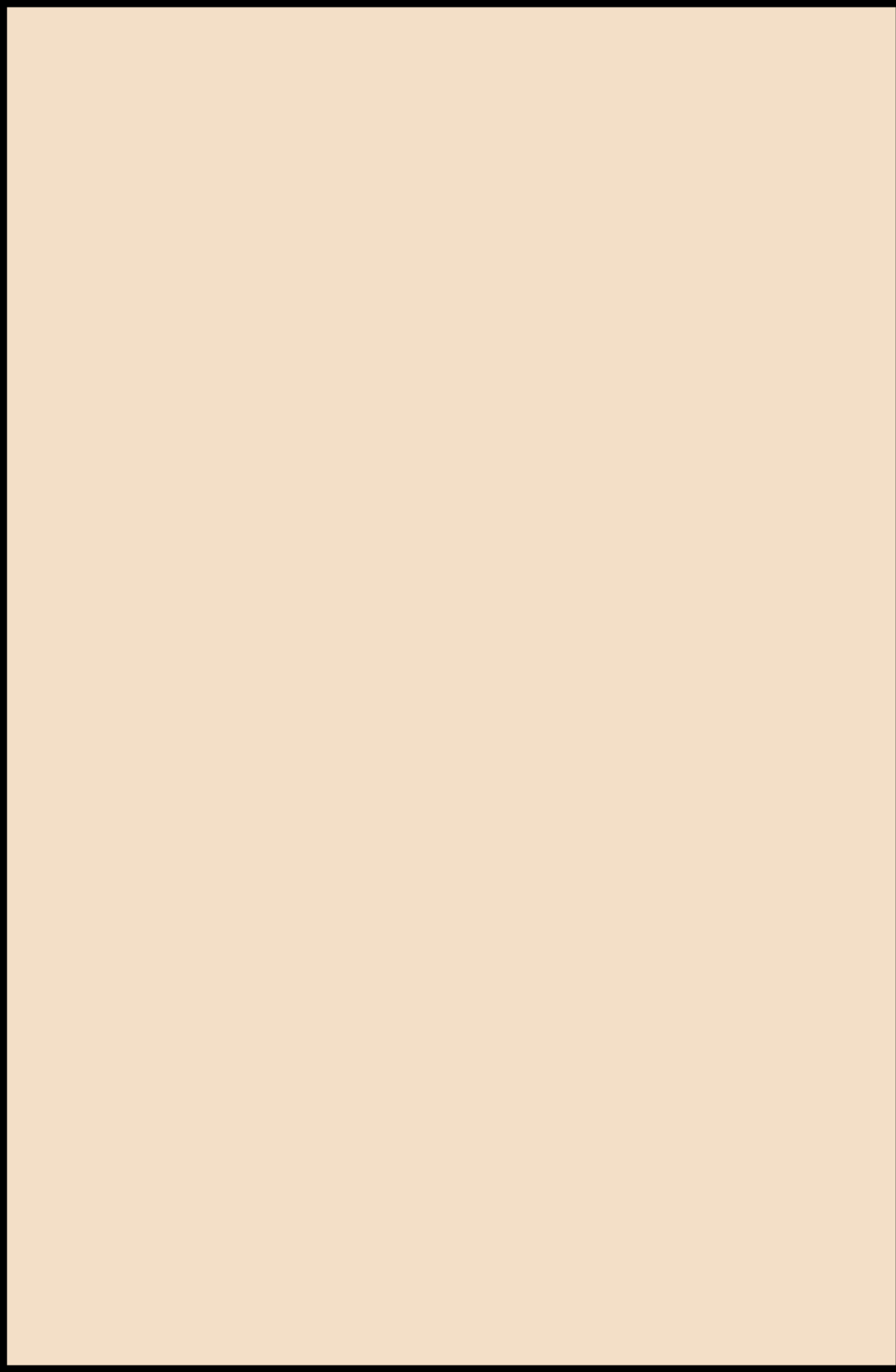

The *Pep Squad* unquestionably portrayed the spirit of *New Boston High* that inspired the boys to an undefeated season.



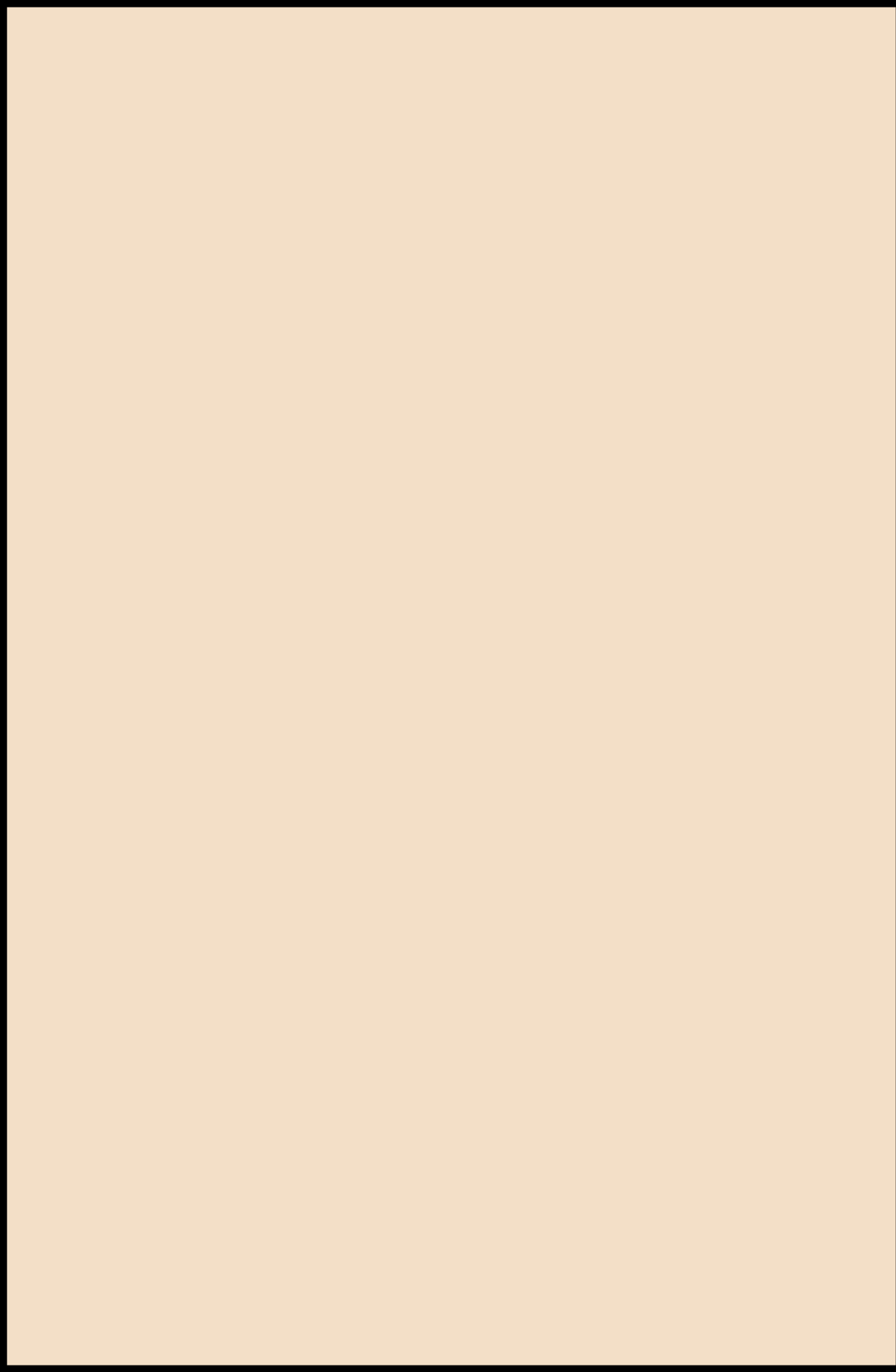

In an all-out war effort for 1943-1944 the *New Boston* chapter set up as their one main objective the stepping up of all production of much needed food commodities. To aid in this production courses in wood working and the repair of the farm machinery were offered, with *Mr. W. S. McCright* as instructor. In the spring of 1943 a course of food conservation was offered with *Mr. McCright* as instructor.

In December, 1930 the *Federal Government* appropriated funds to establish farm shops throughout the *United States*. The expenditures of these funds were placed in the hands of the *Vocational Agricultural Department* of the *State Department of Education*.

In less than two months after funds were available, the *New Boston Vocational Agricultural Department* was designated as one of the training centers. Since that time around nine hundred dollars worth of shop equipment has been purchased by the federal government and turned over to the *Vocational Agricultural Department*.

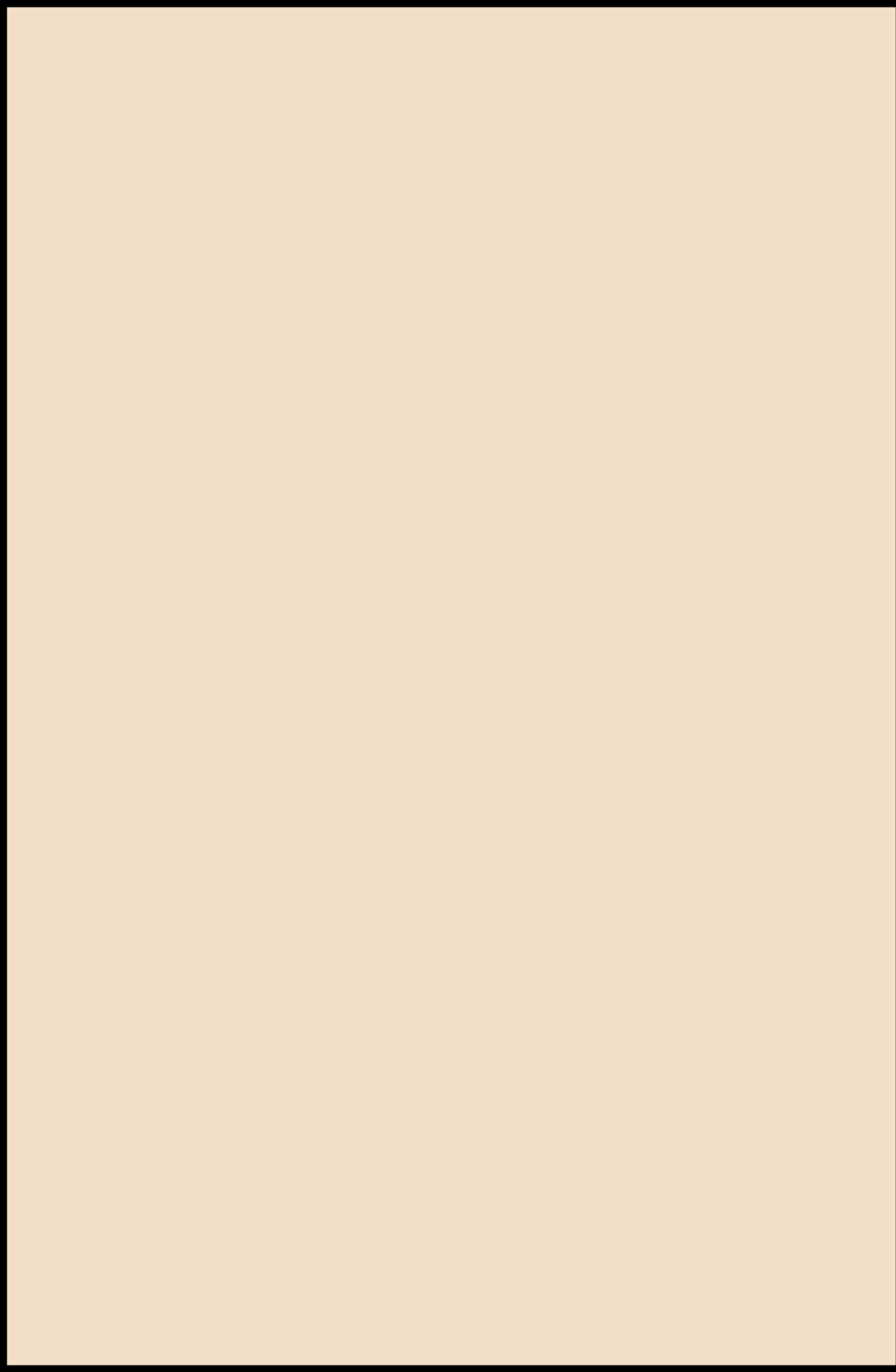
