THE FIFTY-ONERS

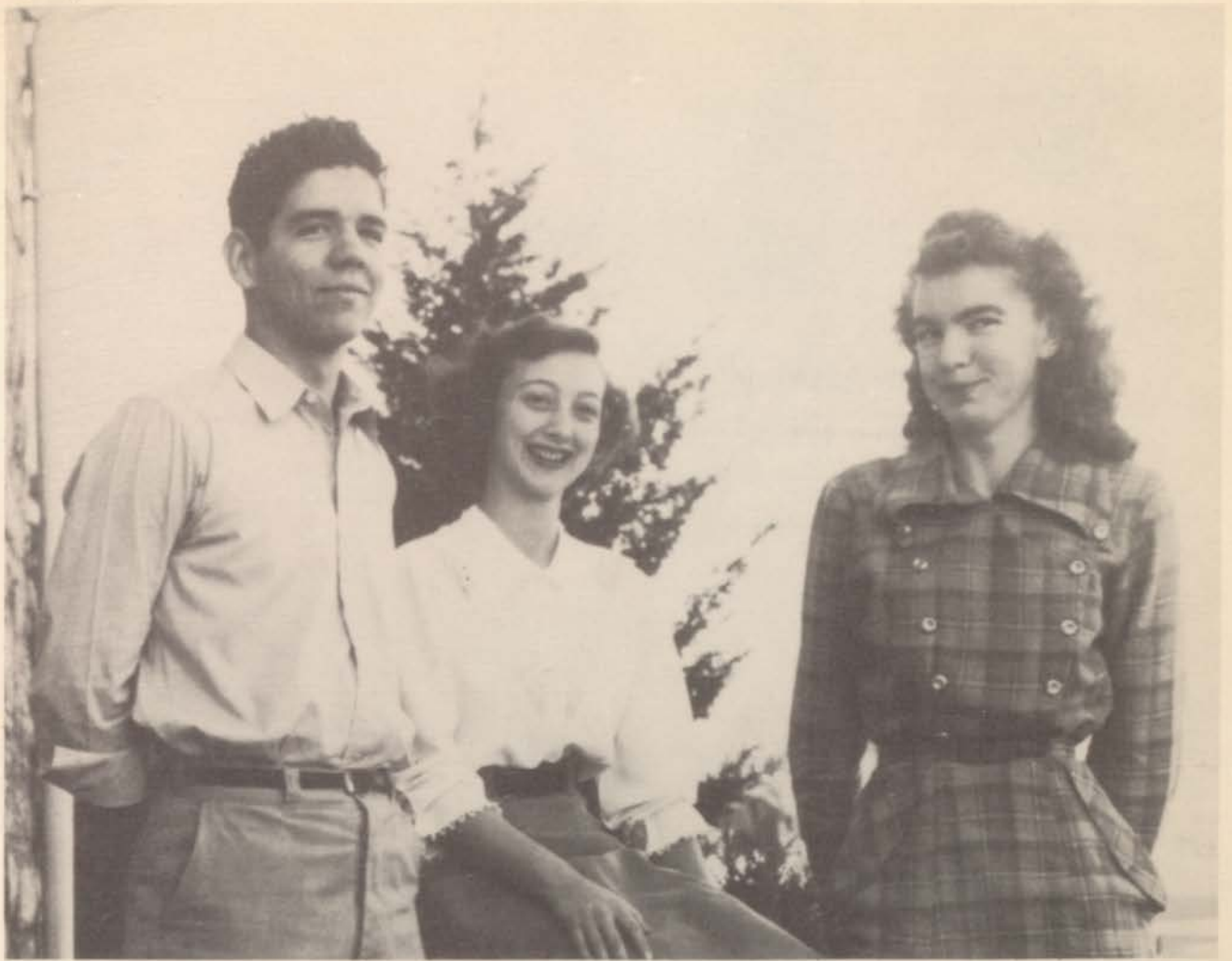
