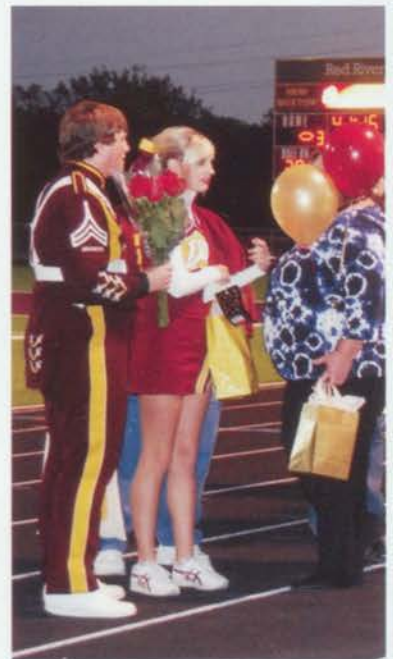

The floor was hard and nasty. People were starting to stare. The salesgirl thought she was crazy, but counselor Paula Turner was on a mission - her son needed jeans with no frays.

The dress code, particularly regarding blue jeans, underwent a change after years of holey abuse. Vice Principal Angela Hastings and Principal Brian Bobbitt put a stop to showing skin when wearing jeans.

In previous years, the dress code made no mention of frays in jeans, and holes had to be four inches above the knee or less. When students started abusing the code, however, Hastings and Bobbitt set out to amend the situation.

"I was tired of dealing with students who couldn't use wise judgment on how to dress in public and follow the code that was in place," Hastings said.

Bobbitt shared Hastings'

attitude towards students' behavior regarding the previous code.

"Students were always pushing the envelope on the holes issue, and we felt like the teachers should be focused on teaching and not the dress code," Bobbitt said.

While some rolled their eyes at the new code, many told both Bobbitt and Hastings the code was unfair.

"Some told me they

couldn't find jeans without holes," Hastings said. "When I told them JC Penney's, Wal-Mart and Target had them, they told me they didn't shop at those places - I told them to just wear dress pants."

Though frays have been outlawed, the punishment for dress code violations has not changed.

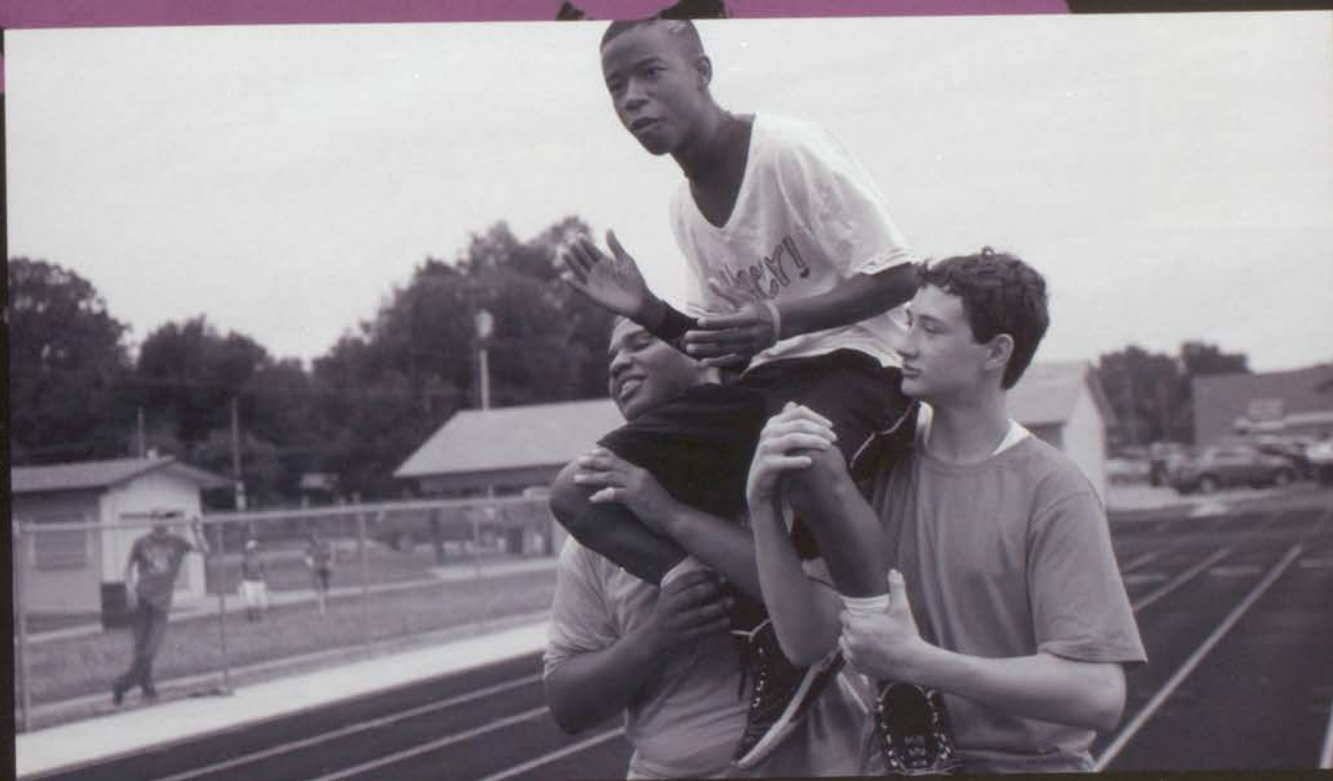

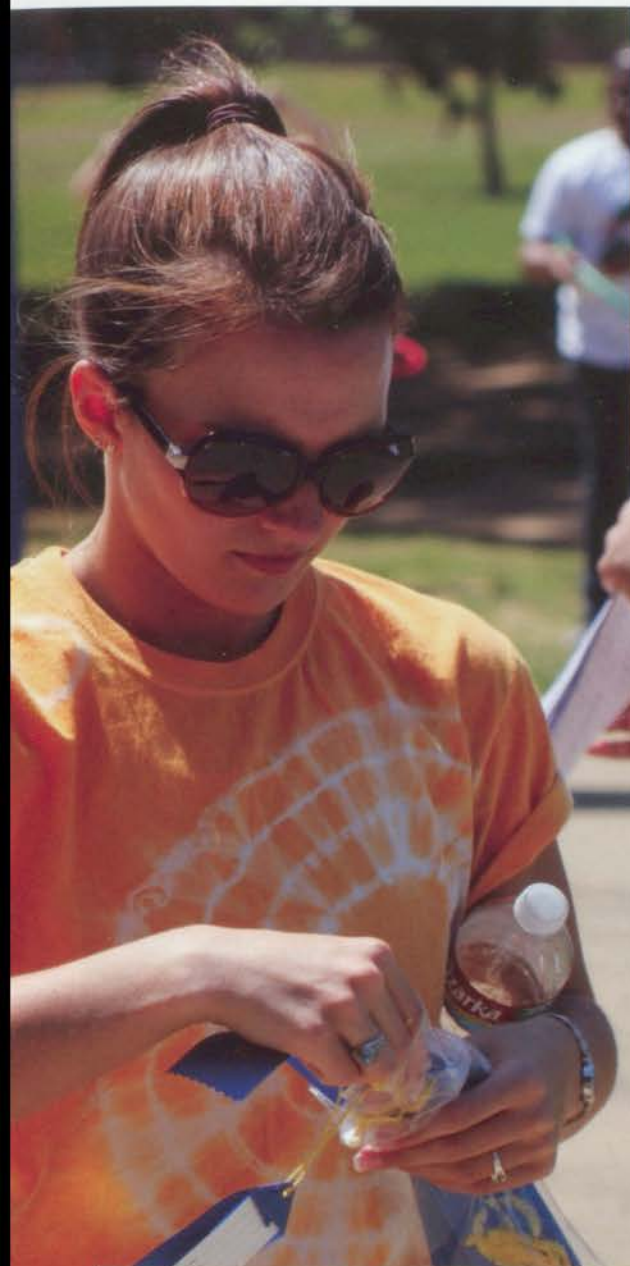

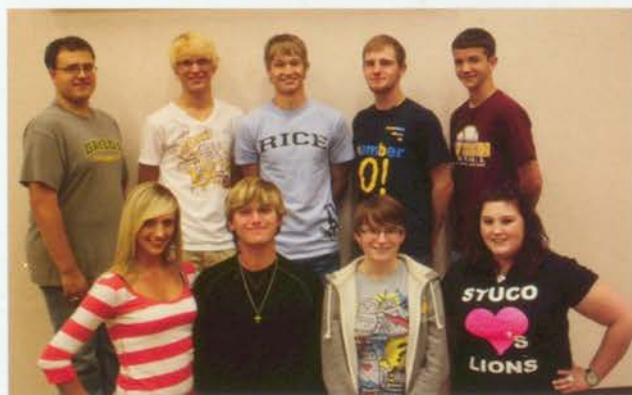
Math and science club take top honors at state

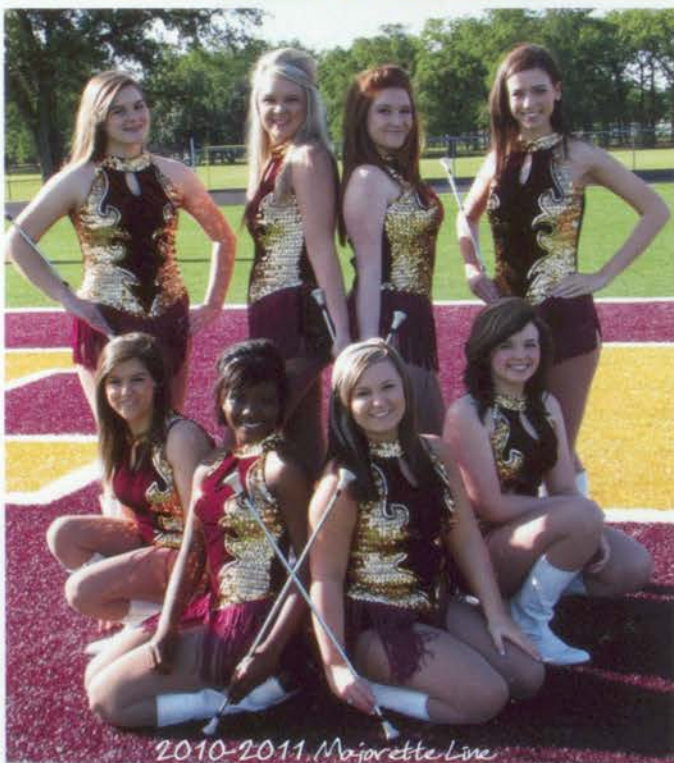

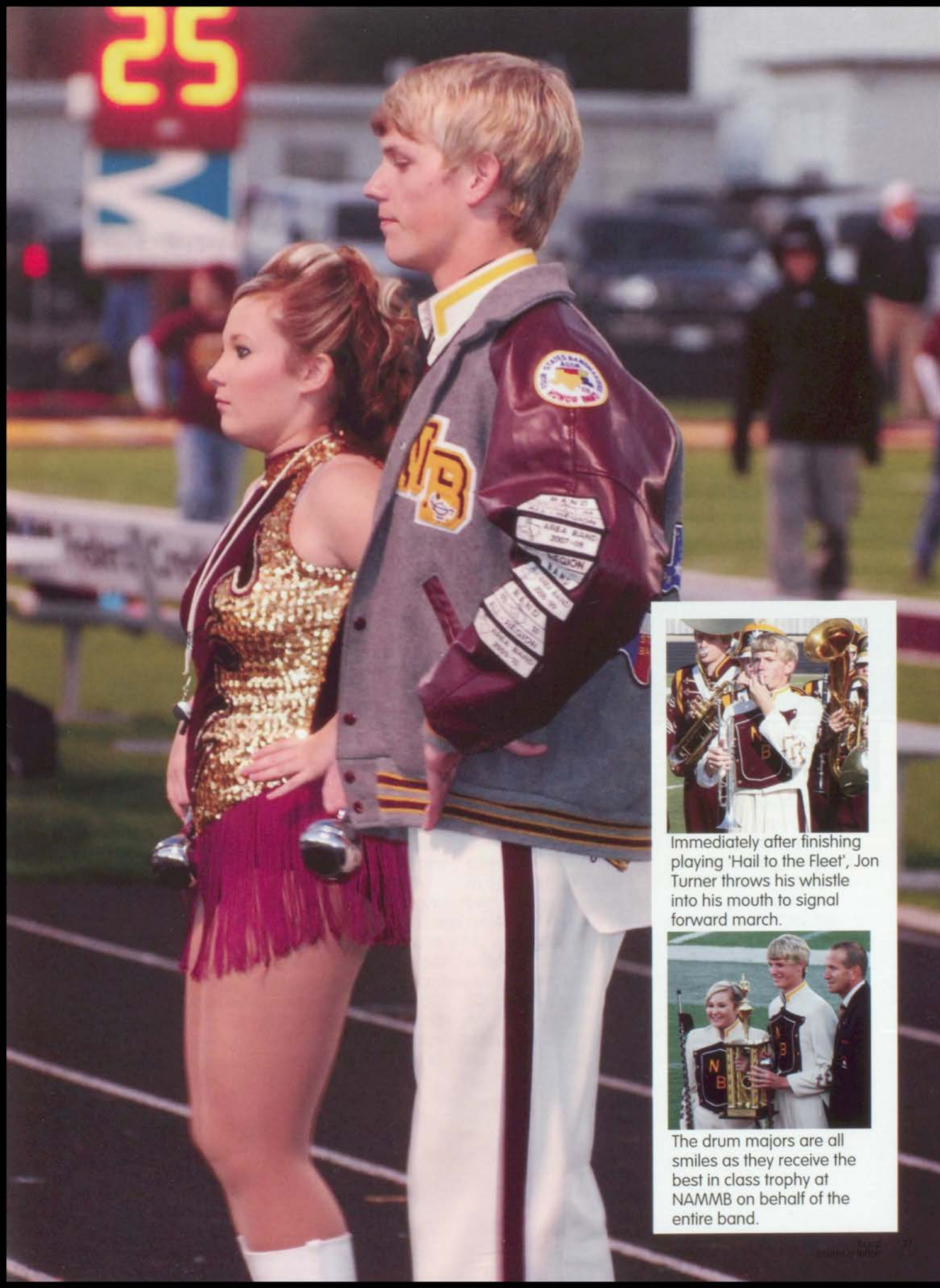

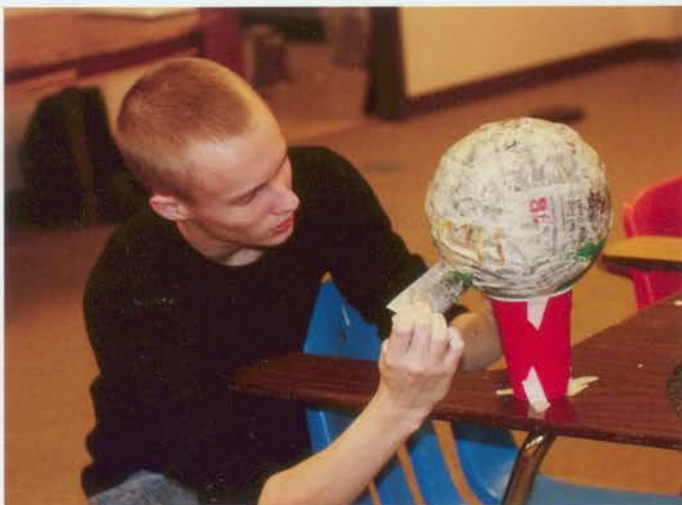

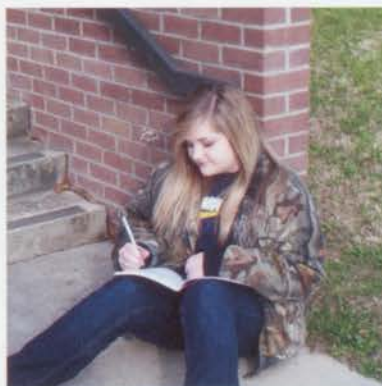

"Yearbook isn't just a class or a club," Bailee said. "We all know how to get on each other's last nerves, but even though we all have our pet peeves, we are a family."

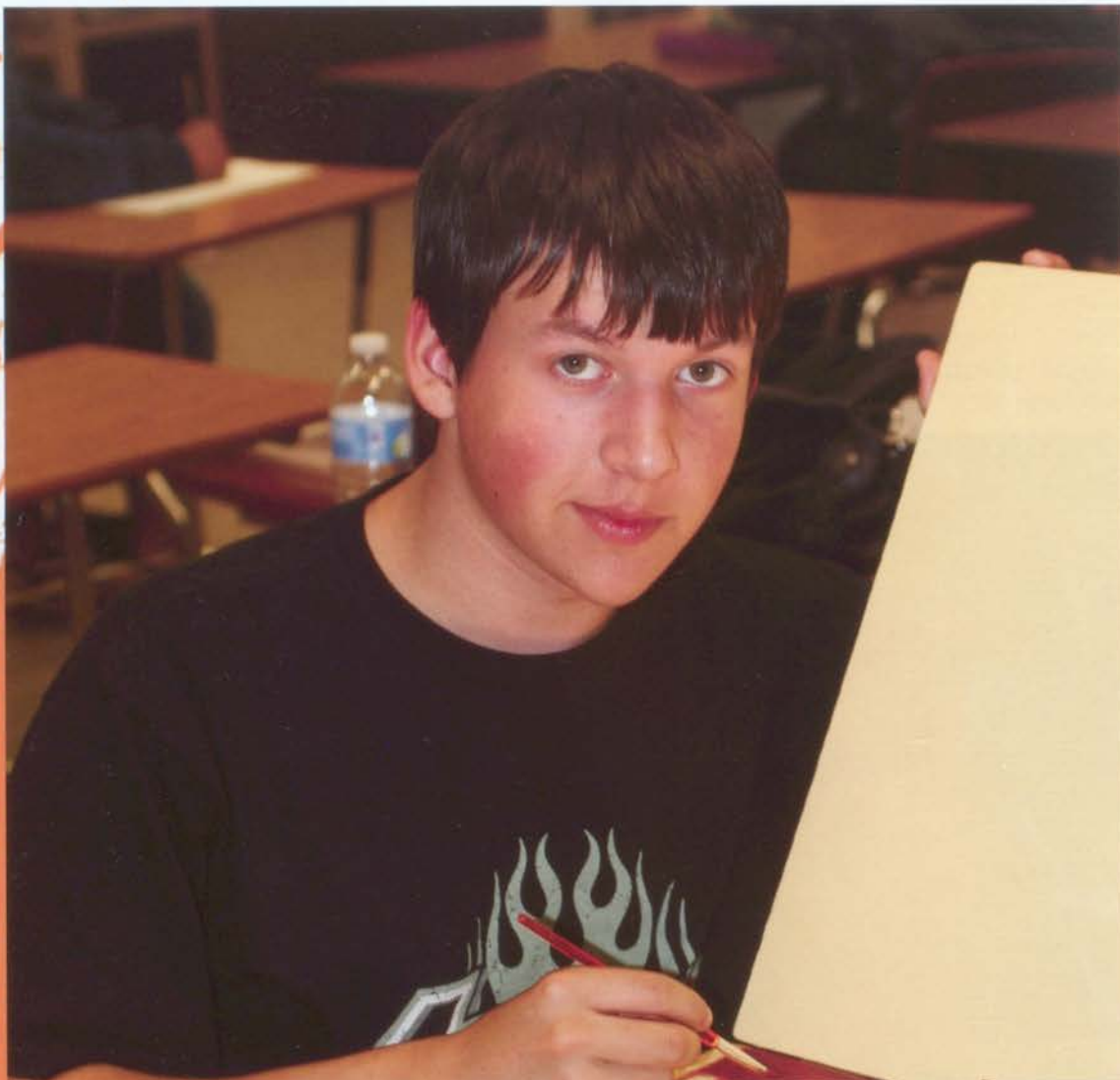

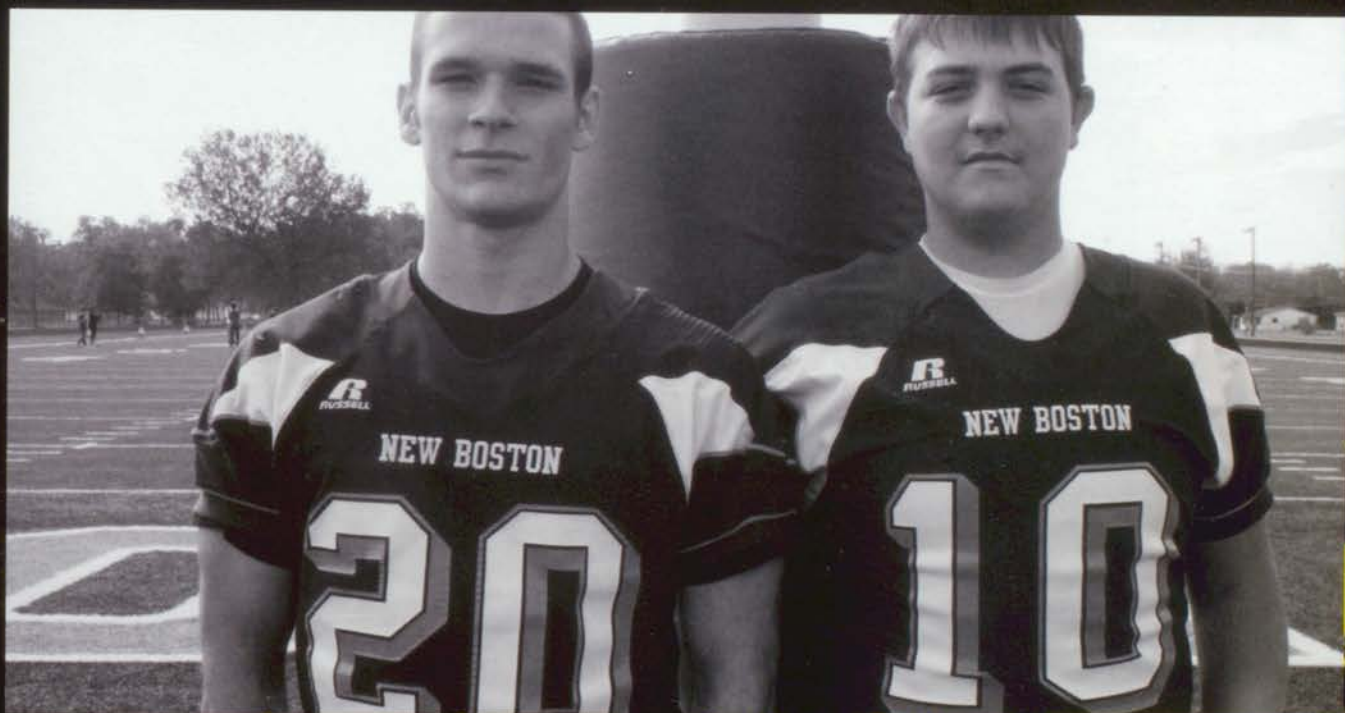

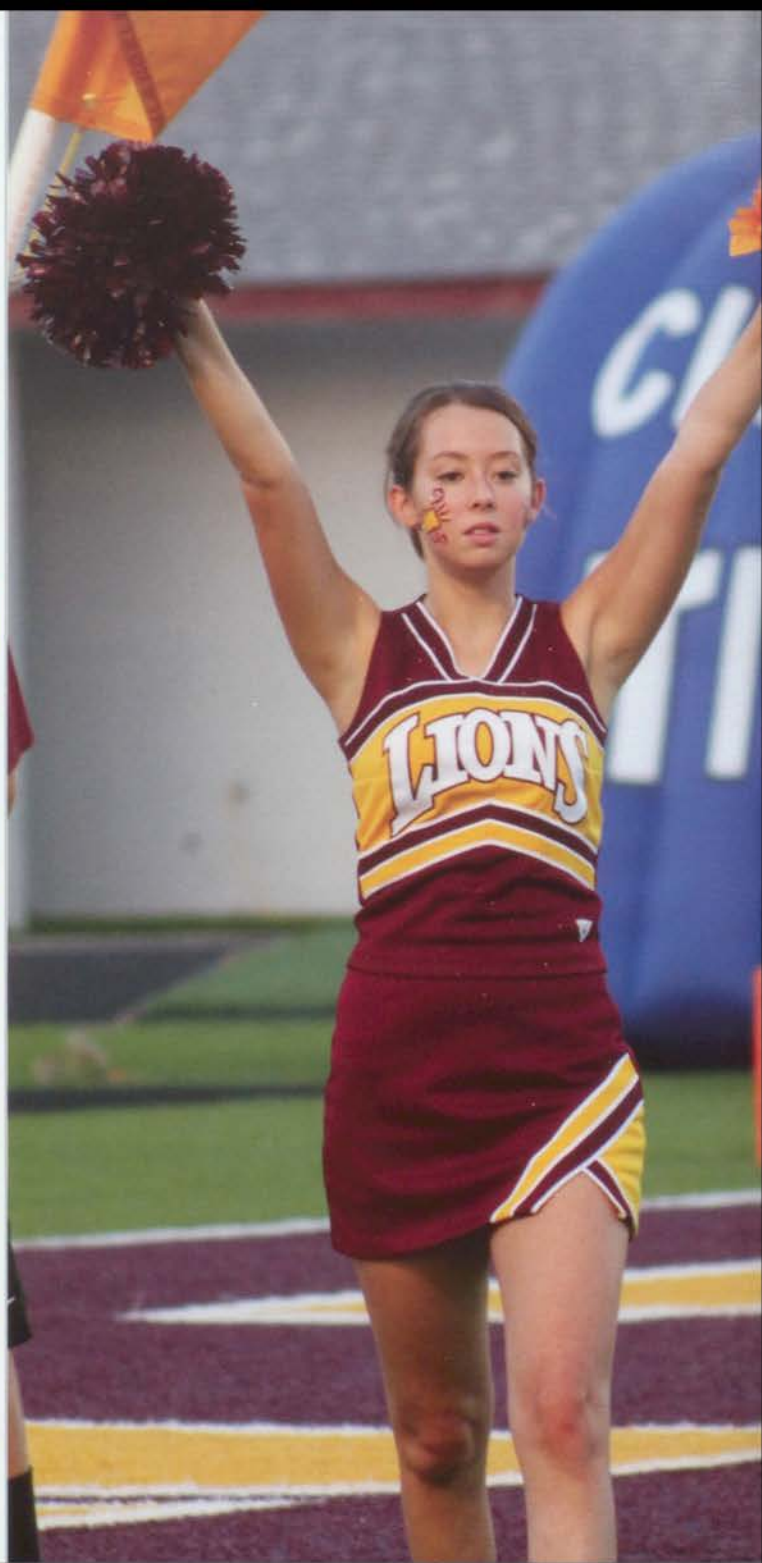

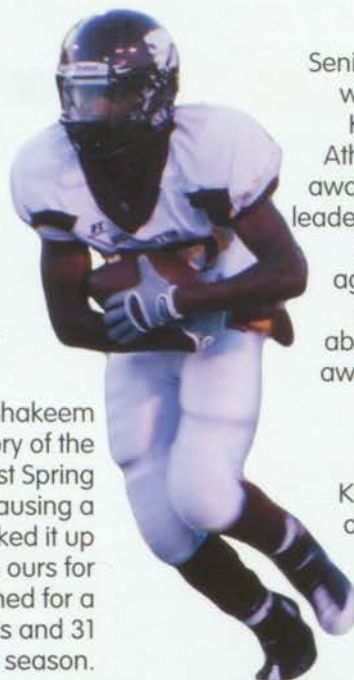

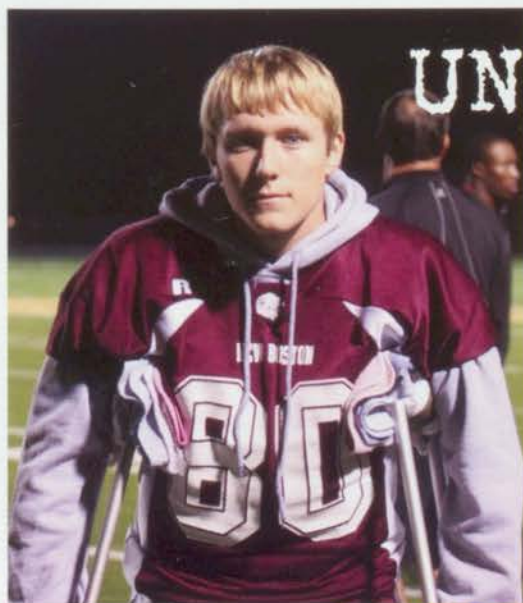

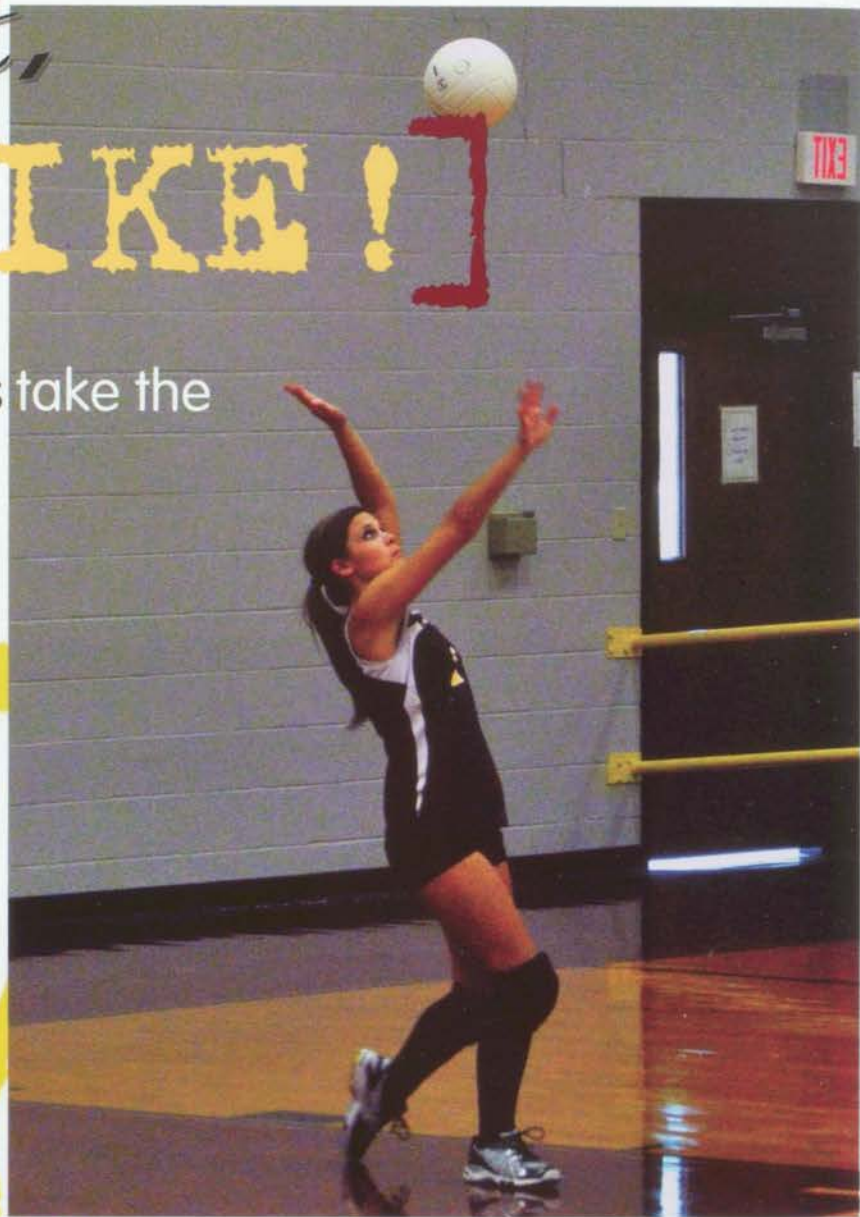

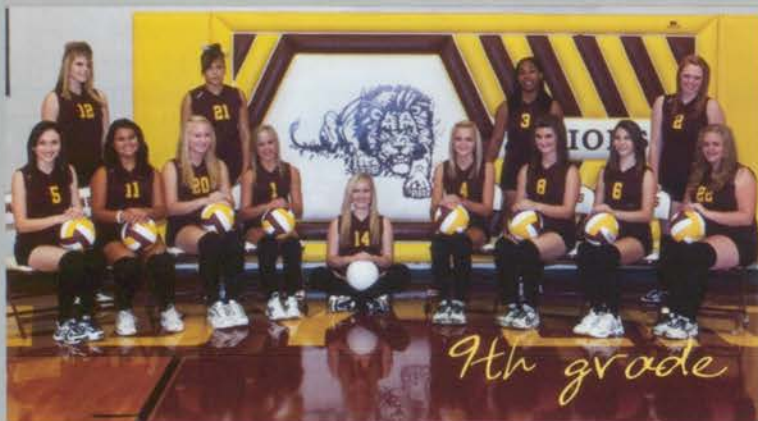

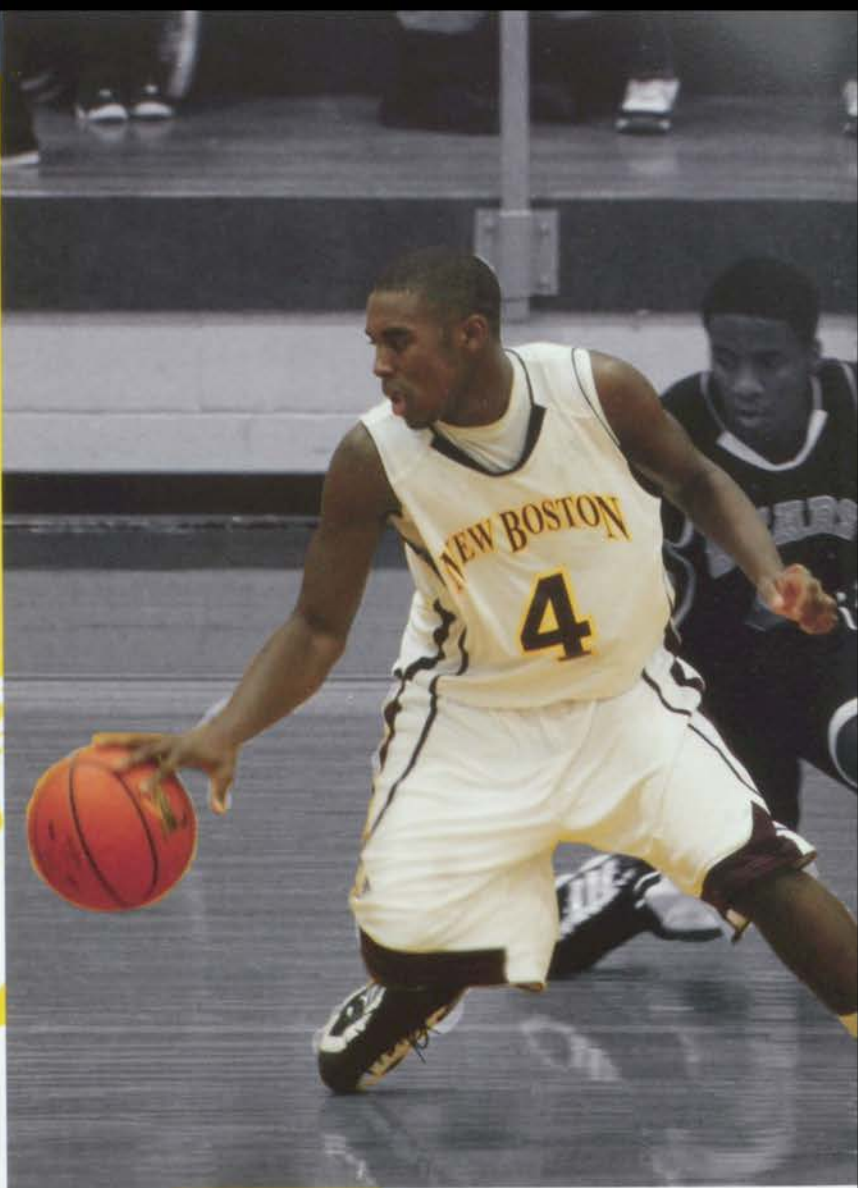

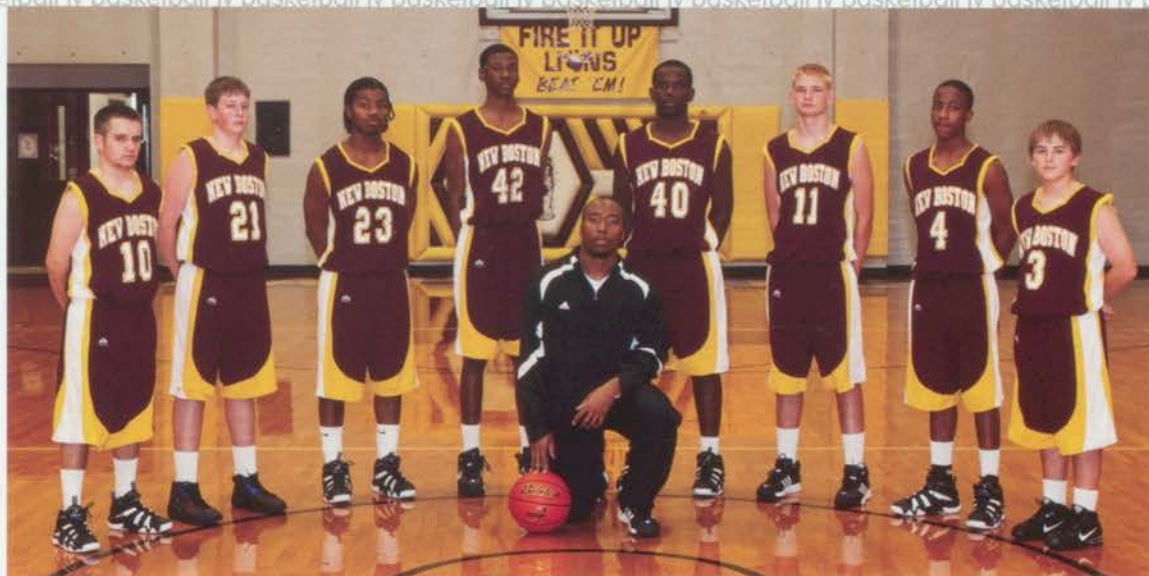

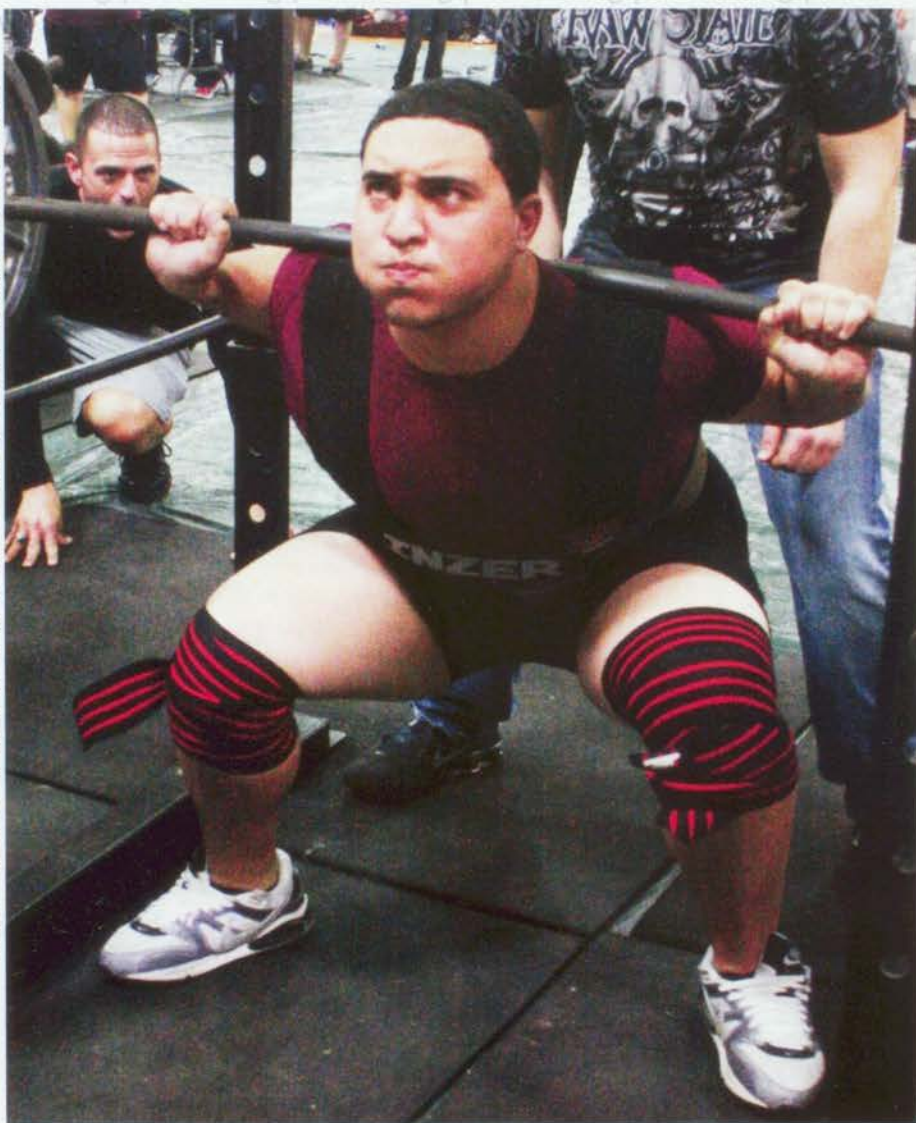

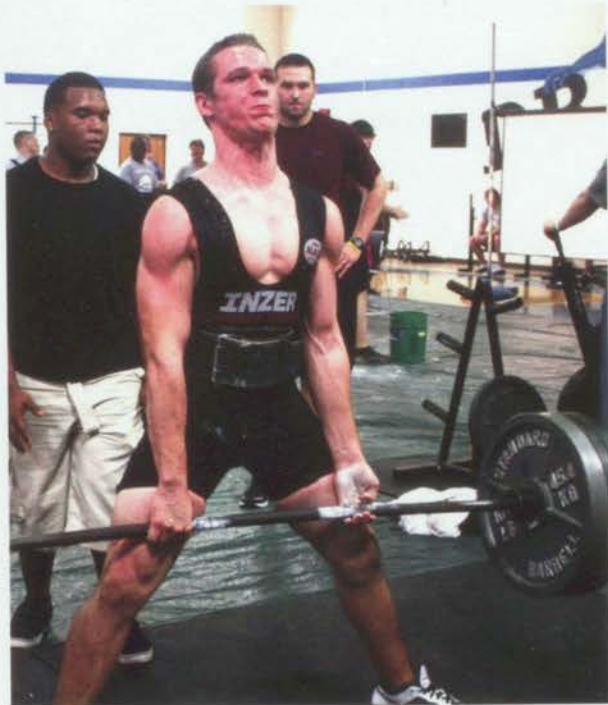

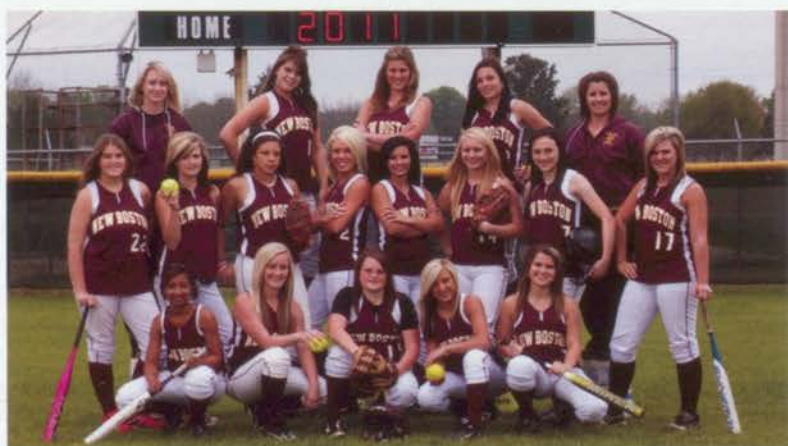

"The scores for JV may not be great, but the memories and the people on the team are."

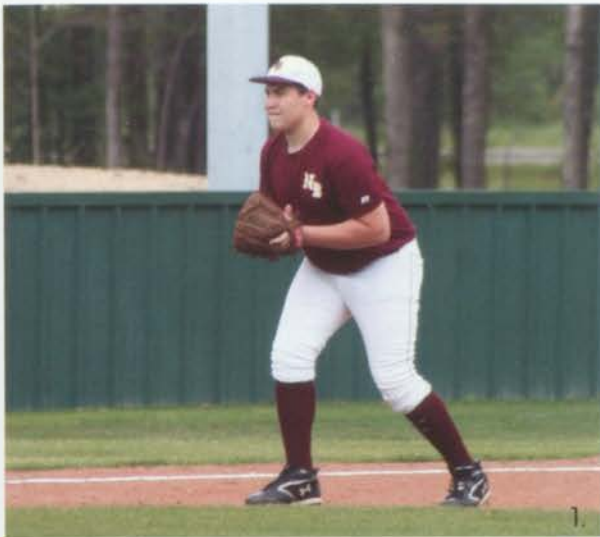

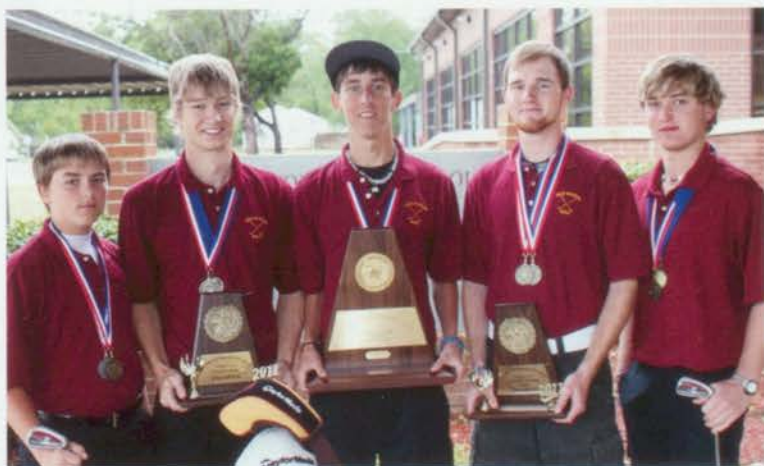

Since her loss, Madison has rebuilt her **identity**, making new friends and a new **life** for herself.

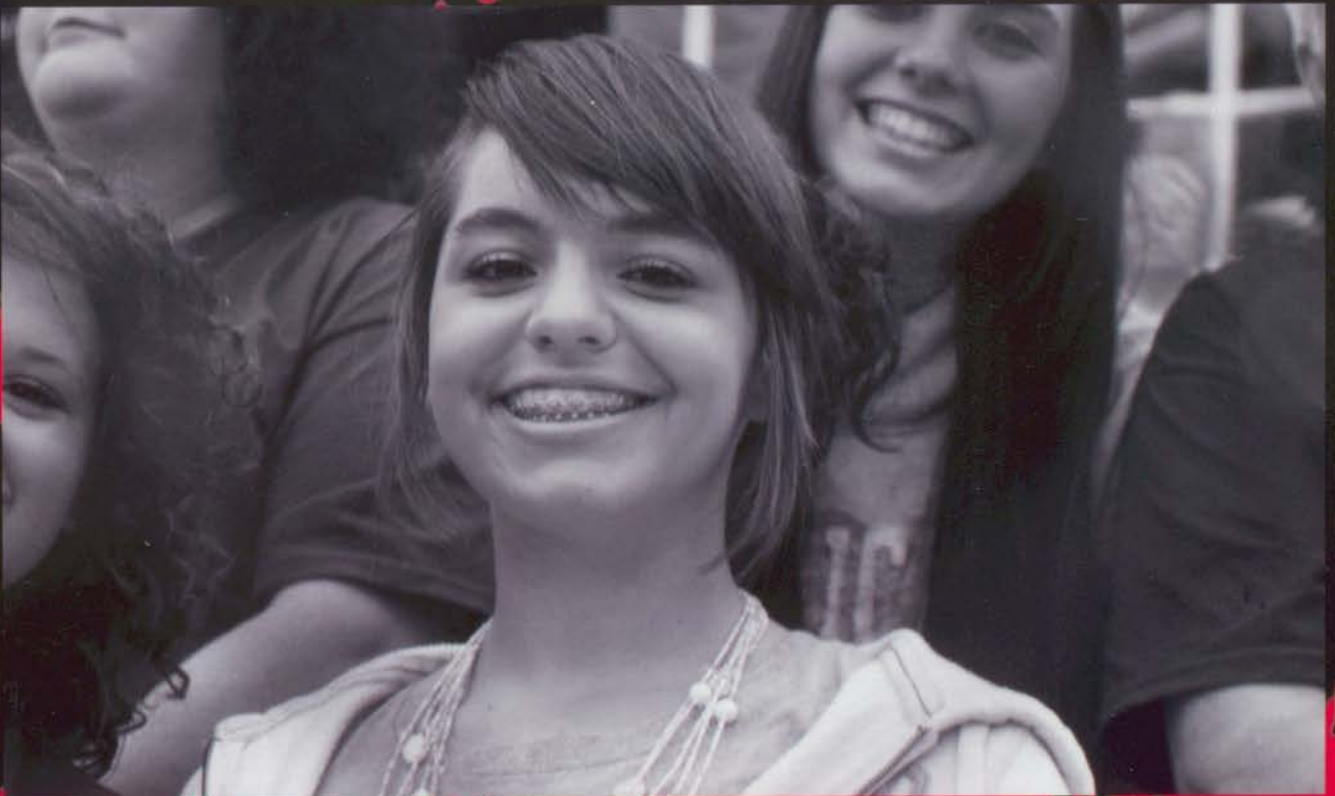
"I may not remember everything from before, but I've had a great time making new **memories**," Madison said.

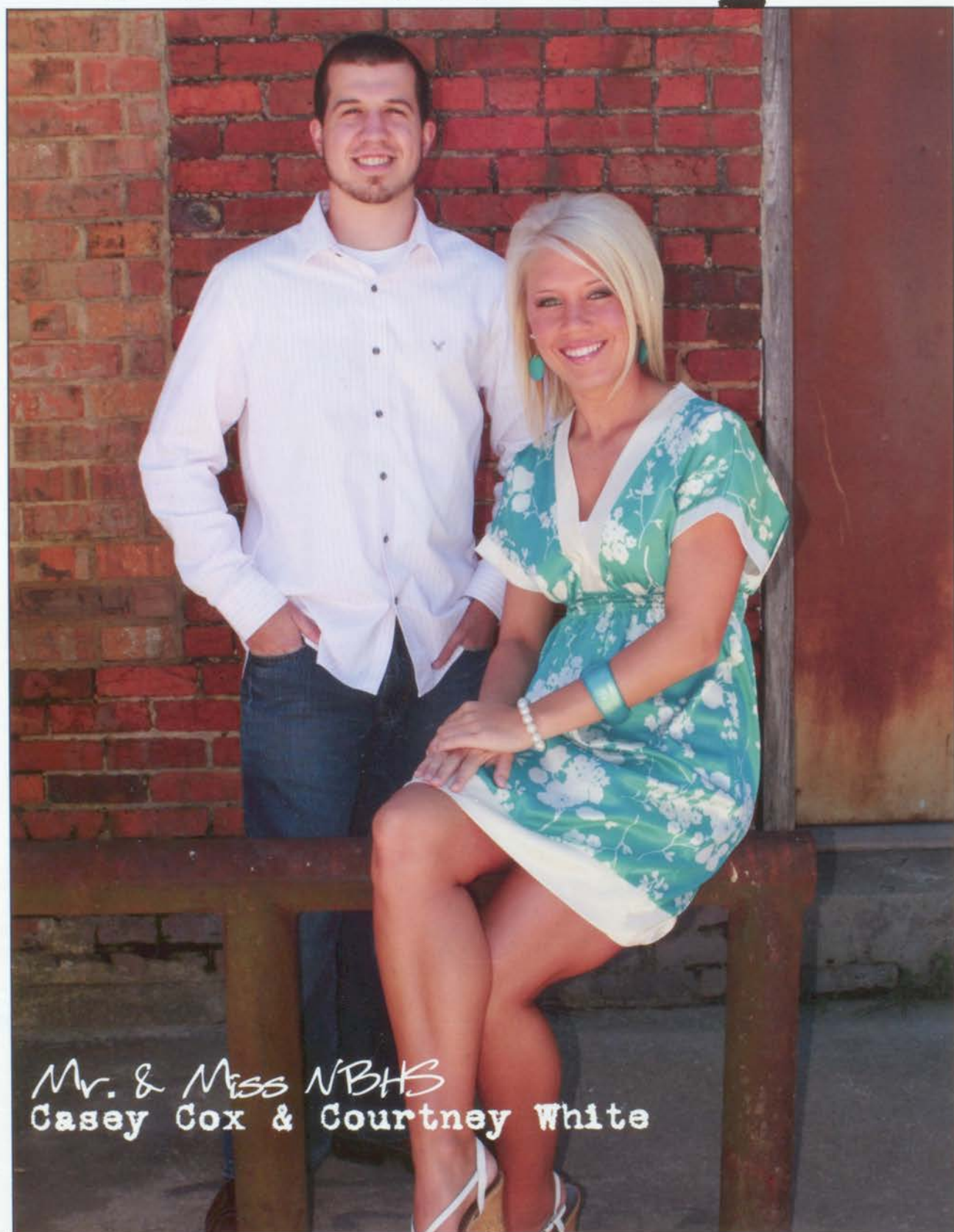

teachers take losing to a new level

Weight loss has never been competitive. Besides the woman who is at the gym trying to lose more weight than her friend, (so she can gloat she lost more) weight loss has been more of a personal quest for vanity ... or even health.

Middle school teachers, however, decided that a competitive edge would be the best way to speed up weight loss. Many teachers decided to be real losers.

"After Christmas break, many of our staff members needed a boost in their weight loss," Counselor Melissa Reid said. "We are a very competitive staff, so it seemed like The Biggest Loser would work out for us. It was a lot of fun."

The majority of the faculty wanted to not only lose their extra weight, but wanted to gain a little money at the same time.

"All participants paid an entry fee which was \$30," Reid said. "There were 18

participants for a total of \$540. First prize won 2/3 of the total money, equaling \$360. Second and third prize shared the remaining money. Second place received \$100 and third place won \$80."

In her personal attempt, Reid felt she fell a little below her goal.

"I counted calories and tried to stick to 1,200 a day," Reid said. "I lost five pounds. It was not enough!"

The teachers, like Reid, faced a few

challenges along the way to losing weight.

"When I realized I couldn't win, I just gave up," Reid said. "I think weight loss will always be a struggle for me. I need to choose healthier foods and exercise. Even though I know this, it is still very difficult to do."

She shot lemons out of a canon into an unsuspecting parking lot. He jumped off of a desk onto the floor of his classroom. She blasted her music at the front of the class.

Teachers are going crazy.

Actually, they are finding ways to bring some life back into their teaching. After many years of teaching, teachers are embracing changes in students, changes in teaching styles, and changes in curriculum.

Math teacher Carrie Johnston started teaching about 10 years ago. She entered into the profession on an emergency certification.

"I didn't have a strong education background so I used my textbook a lot," Johnston said. "When I was in high school and college, lectures and textbooks were the main sources of information."

Johnston started off teaching with what she knew and was familiar with - only the textbook.

"I realized early on that if I allowed the textbook to be my primary source of curriculum, my students wouldn't be successful," Johnston said. "Students were bored and their retention was poor. That's when I began looking at other sources of curriculum."

Her first step was talking with other teachers, seeing what made them successful. She learned she needed to use hands-on activities as much as possible to make the material relevant to their lives.

"It was difficult at first, because I didn't have the experience, and I didn't have ready-made materials," Johnston said. "I created my own materials and used lessons from the internet and from workshops."

Johnston attended as many workshops and activities the school would allow her, as well as researching online. She still continues to find new and interesting things to put some life back into her lessons plans.

"One colleague told me to 'beg, borrow and steal ideas.'" Johnston said. "I do that and try to make them my own."

Johnston's Math Models classes were having problems understanding concepts such as perimeter, area and volume.

Naturally, her remedy to the situation was to head to Lowe's.

"We found construction materials and items for the home and created lists of prices of the items we liked the most," Johnston said. "We looked at paint, lumber, floor tiles, carpet, sheet rock, glass, fences, garden mulch and much more. We took these items and used what we learned to find the area of floor to be covered and how much carpet or tile to be used, the amount of sheet rock required to create a room at certain sizes, the volume of space for concrete and mulch. We designed our

garden spaces and figured the amount of tiles needed to enclose the area."

Before beginning the construction project, Johnston's classes watched a video on the designs and construction ideas for futuristic buildings in Japan that are 2/3 mile tall. She readily embraces these changes in technology with videos.

"Students live in a technological world," Johnston said. "In high school I was first introduced to computers. It took about thirty minutes to type a prewritten program that changed the screen color and played three notes of music. I don't even remember having a calculator in math class. The computer also helps to create assignments and correspond. With the internet, I have access to thousands of videos that I use as often as possible."

Teachers know they must change and adapt in order to reach their students. Finding ways to inject life into old material means rejuvenating curriculum and embracing the change. Johnston, like other good teachers, is constantly **keeping it fresh**.

"Every year I reevaluate my curriculum and classroom management and look for areas to improve," Johnston said. "I will never be completely satisfied. Always wanting

improve is necessary in teaching and if I quit striving to improve, it will be time for me to retire. My goal is for student success and

I will use technology, hands-on activities, field trips (virtual and real) and anything else I can get my hands on to be successful. By the way, there are some really great math apps for the iPhone."

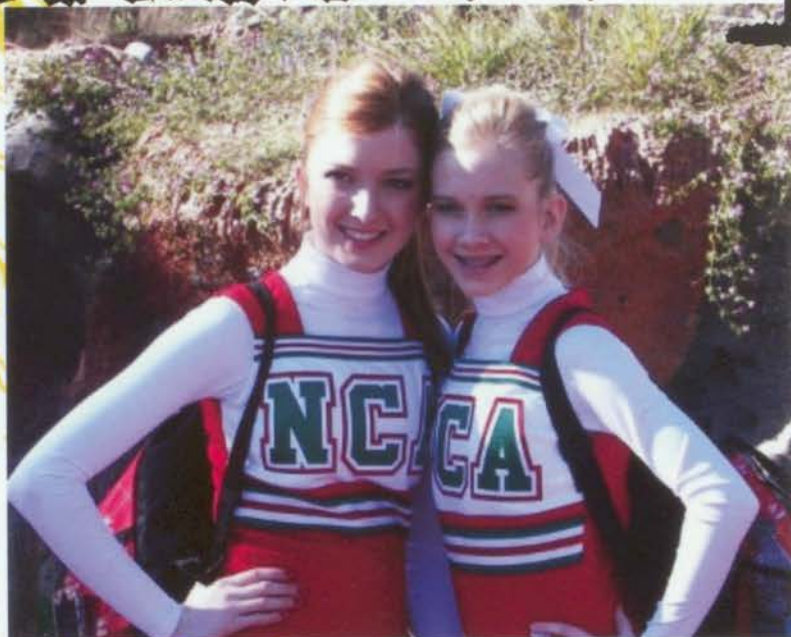

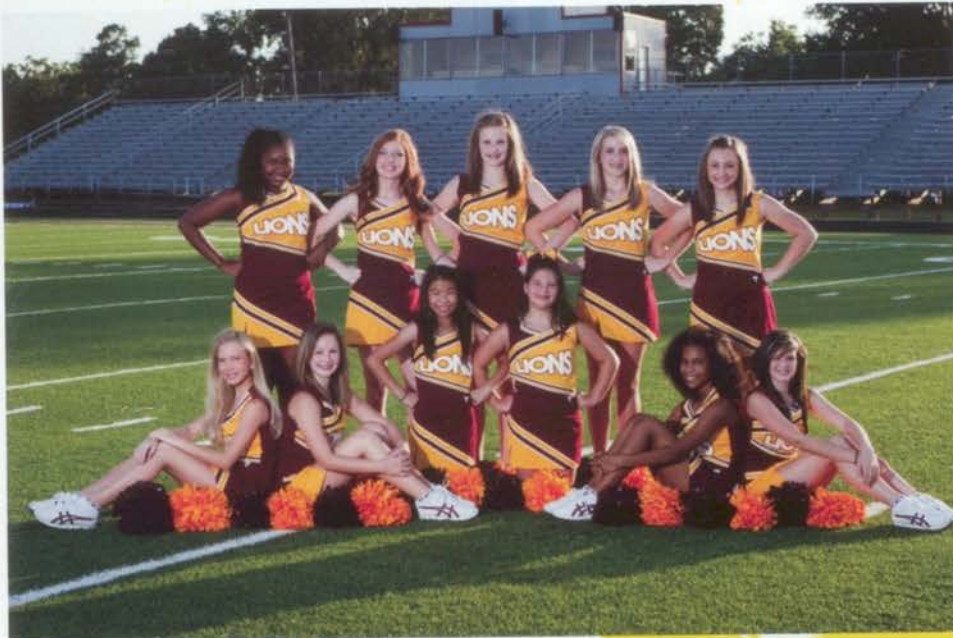

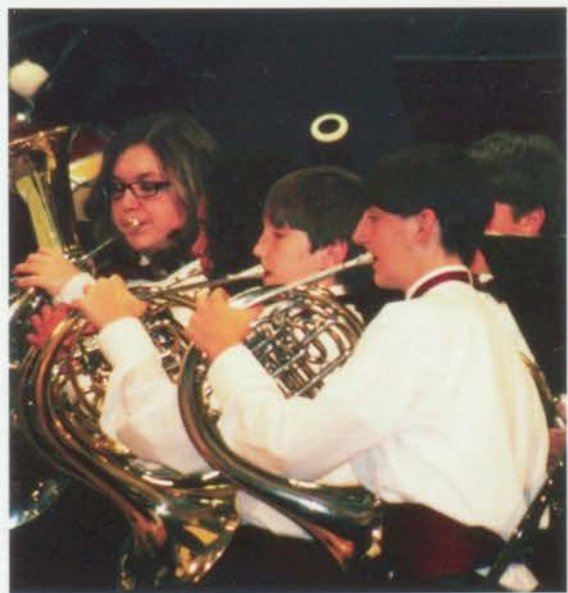

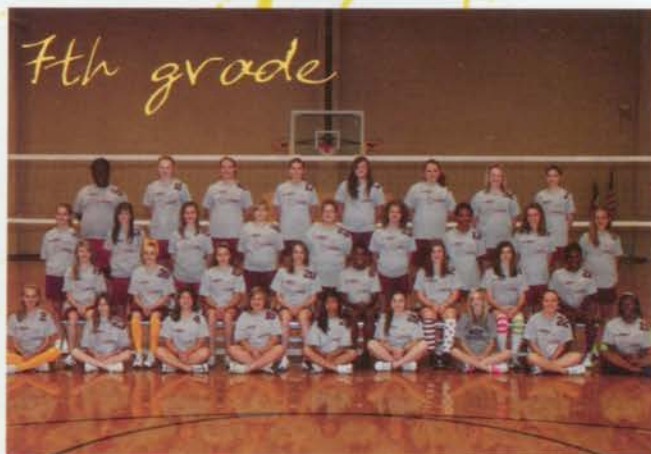
